McKinley, Iberville, Cohn Among Winners

Several games involving LIALO teams were played on the local front last night with McKinley, Iberville, Cohn, Northwestern and West Livingston gaining wins.

McKinley romped to a 90-69 triumph over Rosenwald, while Iberville got its offense rolling again to nab a 93-79 triumph over Southdown of Houma. Cohn clipped Park Avenue, 77-61, while Northwestern played a red-hot offense and a chilly defense in ripping Dawson, 108-99.

Benjamin Morris had a sizzling 48 markers as West Livingston shot down Sunshine, 91-82 at Sunshine.

McKinley got revenge for an early season loss with a fast-breaking offense to smother Rosenwald in a 3-AAA, District II game to hike their mark to 9-14.

The Panthers trailed but once, 15-14, at the end of the first period and raced to a 39-30 lead at the halfway point.

Guard Don Jingles jangled throughout the night with 27 markers while center Andre Turner turned in 21 markers. Nathaniel McGuire's 13 and Jerry Jingles 12 aided the Panther cause.

Rosenwald, absorbing its second loss in district play, was

sparked by Darrell Pierre with 21 markers.

The win for McKinley, which faces Capitol and Scotlandville in remaining loop games, was the first in league play for the Panthers.

Northwestern had to rally in the last half to win over Dawson, after the eventual losers showed a 46-42 halftime advantage.

The EBR team, however, wasted little time in getting ahead, outscoring Dawson, 38-21, in the third quarter for an 80-67 lead going into the final quarter.

Leading the attack for the victors was Clemson Stewart with 37 while Holden fired through 34 and Carter hit for 25. Dawson's Collins had 30 while Duncans bucketed 29 and Parker hit for 19.

Iberville jumped to a 24-15 first period lead and never let up in trouncing Southdowns. The Iberville team used the tilt to warmup for their big outing

against defending champ Greenville Park of Hammond at home Monday night.

Joseph Simpson led the winners with 28 markers while Ronald Johnson fired through 30. Edward Williams had 19 for Southdowns which also had three men with 18 markers.

Cohn High romped over Park Avenue with Gary Brown showing the way with 25 markers. James Ireland had 20 for the losers while Moore hit for 23 and Dogan had 12 for Cohn.

Clarence Gilliam had 32 markers in Henderson's 99-75 romp over Boston High of Lake Charles.

Capitol Junior High won over Northwestern's freshmen, 61-39 with John White leading the winners with 14 and Charlie Thomas hitting 11 for the losers.

Carver Tops Central '5'

Hurlbert Gets 24 Points in Victory

"We're No. 1!" cried the Landry players and coaches after the Buccaneers had defeated Martyn, 55-52, Friday night in the Indians gymnasium, in a thriller.

Landry and Martyn went into the contest in a deadlock, 4-1, for the Louisiana Interscholastic Athletic and Literary Organization District 5 lead.

The Bucs have undisputed possession of first place now, and as their coach, Vic Vavasour, said — "We're in the driver's seat and nothing is going to turn us back. Boys, we are first because we tried harder and had confidence in ourselves."

The Bucs will meet Lincoln in a non-district tilt Saturday night, and still have district games against Carver and Central Memorial of Bogalusa remaining.

Friday night Carver trimmed Central 67-57 in the Rams' gym. The victory was the Rams' first-district win of the season. Robert Hurlbert with 24, Ozzie Williams with 15 and Robert Wilks with 14 paced Carver to their victory. Scoring in double figures for Central were Charles Spikes, 15; Larry Laurent, 14; and Lionell Henry, 12.

While pre-game announcements had claimed that Landry's Kenneth Thomas and Martyn's Nathaniel Chaney would probably stage a personal duel, Thomas was hot and closed his night's performance with 21, while Chaney was off and racked up only 5, with three coming in the first half's action. Vincent Lombard also had 21 for Landry.

In LIALO District 3 action, Greenville Park defeated McDonogh 35's Roneagles, 76-67, at Behrman gym. The Hornets held a commanding 37-25 advantage over McDonogh at intermission, which proved to be more than the Roneagles could overcome.

Larry Neal claimed high scoring honors for Greenville with 22 while Willie Varnado had 21 and Hugh Washington 12. Curtis Simmons with 20 and Louis Elloie with 19 spearheaded McDonogh's attack. Greenville Park is now 4-2, and McDonogh 1-5 in district standings.

Cohen Topples Martyn
in LIALO, 67-62

Flashy guard Kenneth Thomas of the Landry Bucs pumped in 25 points to lead his team to a 61-50 win over Carver Tuesday night at Landry gym.

The win gave Landry at least a tie for District V honors in Louisiana Interscholastic Athletic and Literary Organization play. A win over Central Friday night will give Landry the undisputed title.

In another LIALO inter-district game Tuesday night Cohen topped Martyn, 67-62, at Cohen gym.

Thomas connected on four straight field goals to give Landry an 11-point lead at the end of the first quarter as the Bucs continued to pour in the points. Landry took a commanding lead as the horn sounded for the half, 35-18.

In the third quarter coach Blakely's Rams used their zone defense to stop the Bucs' surge. Joe Gould led Carver scoring with 9 points in the quarter as Landry's lead was cut to 45-32.

The Rams, with their never-say-die spirit, scored seven quick points to pull within six points, 45-39, with 7:30 left in the final quarter. Coach Vavasser's chargers began to get the Rams in foul trouble and Thomas, Lombard, Jones and Webb accounted for the final 16 points to give the Bucs their win.

Landry and Washington Came Through

The two district championships in the Louisiana Inter-scholastic Athletic and Literary Organization have been decided, and not even an unknown computing system could have been more accurate than were the pre-season predictions and later expectations after the season progressed.

Landry's Buccaneers were predicted to win the District 5 championship for a second straight year, and that Coach Victor Vavasseur's charges did. In LIALO District 3, with a seasoned quintet to hit the floor with the year, Coach Theodore "Abie" Washington's Washington Lions were the heavy choice, and, like Landry, the Lions have their district crown salted away, just waiting to be officially crowned.

The Bucs have closed their season and are patiently awaiting their assignment in the zone and district playoffs, but Washington has still two conference games remaining. Tuesday the Lions will face Cohen in the Hornets' "nest," and Friday McDonogh 35's Roneagles will be the guest of Washington in the Lions' den. Cohen is trailing Washington by 1½ games and even if the Hornets would upset Washington the Lions "have it made."

The Lions are undefeated in their league and it is certain that Coach Washington will want to have that distinction of being undefeated on his coaching record and his club's record.

Landry blasted into the league championship with a sizzling 86-63 win over Central Memorial of Bogalusa Friday night. Kenneth Thomas and Vincent Lombard put on a scoring exhibition worthy of note. Thomas edged Lombard 26-25. Thomas hit 13 buckets from the floor while in Lombard's final tally nine points came from the charity line.

Both youngsters are promising college material and may be considered as potential pro-material even at this early date in their cage careers.

Washington's 77-65 win over Greenville was sparked by Donald Williams who led all scorers in LIALO District 3 and 5 with 30 points. Kennon Dright had an off night and was held to nine points.

Martyn can clinch second place in District 5 if the Indians are able to get by Central Tuesday night. A Spartan win would throw Central and Martyn in a deadlock for the place position, which could actually be a three-way tie should the Clark Bulldogs get by Carver. Central and Clark will go into this week's final action with identical 3-4 records, while Martyn is

McKinley kept rolling on its victory streak and Iberville piled up another victory to high-light action involving LLA LO teams in the Baton Rouge area last night.

Captain Carl Stewart's Panthers from McKinley did everything but run Lowery out of the gym in winning, 100-6, while Iberville just missed the century mark in rattling the battlers of Park Avenue, 99-66.

Other hits on tap saw Cheneyville blast Dawson, 95-73, and Cohn take a 63-38 victory over scenic high.

Northwestern's Junior High team won over McKinley, 59-46, with Allen Richardson hitting 22 for the winners.

McKinley used a big second period to start itself on the way to demolishing Lowery.

It was the 16-point second quarter that sealed the doom of the visiting Tigers. Add that total to a first period 18-point out-pout and the locals rested at half-time protecting a 56-29 margin.

No less than five McKinley centers hit for double figures in the cage rout. Center Andre Turner led the brigade with 18 markers followed by mates Leon Paul (17), Jesse Simon and Jerry Jingles with 12 each and Michael Legarde added 11. Eight other Panthers figures in the scoring.

Though outmanned and out-gunned, Lowery was led by forward Roy Quessire with 10 points.

Against Lowery McKinley continued to display the kind of offensive fireworks and defensive savvy that helped to notch their eighth consecutive victory.

The victory ran their count to 12-14 on the season and makes their visiting Wednesday date with Scottsville all the more important. The contest will be final of the season for McKinley.

Three guards and a lone forward played their last contest at home wearing blue and white stripes. Donald Jingles, Ray Campbell, John Cornelius and Nathaniel McGuire dribbled their own song.

In the opening contest the McKinley junior five was handily over the visitors by posting a 64-43 decision.

Lions Remain Unbeaten in District 3

Landry's Buccaneers clinched the District 5 Louisiana Inter-scholastic Athletic and Literary Organization title Friday night by defeating Central of Bogalusa, 86-63.

Albert Dennis to Enroll in September

Albert Dennis, a 6-foot-5, 240-pound lineman from Hammond's Greenville Park High School, signed a grant-in-aid with Tulane Wednesday and became the first Louisiana Negro football player signed by a major college in the state.
An All-State performer as a defensive end and offensive tackle, Dennis was rated as the state's No. 1 line prospect among high school players by Tulane scouts. An A-minus student, Dennis was a four-sport letterman and the starting center on Greenville Park's basketball team.
"We feel privileged to have Albert choose Tulane," said assistant coach Joe Clark, the man who recruited and signed the blue-chipper. "He's got everything you look for in an athlete and has exceptional size and strength, too."
Tulane head coach Jim Pittman was out of town and not present at the signing. Pittman is recruiting in Texas.

Dennis said he chose Tulane because he felt "it was an honor to attend the school. I want to be able to take a proper place in the community when I graduate."
Clark said Dennis was "a fine citizen and outstanding student. He's an excellent addition to our program."
Dennis was the 46th football player to sign with Tulane this year and the third Negro. Pre-state to recruit a Negro basketball player two years ago when Burgess of Houston's Yates High School and Jack Harold Sylvester of Houston's Booker T. Washington previously became the first major school in the state to recruit a Negro basketball player.

Return of Enthusiasm

For the moment Tulane had put enthusiasm back into its football program. With a full battery of newsmen on hand and a variety of cameras poised for action, there was a definite air of restrained excitement floating through coach Jim Pittman's office Thursday.

Tulane, struggling to get its football program on sound footing, was taking another step in the right direction. Albert Dennis was about to become the first Negro football player in Louisiana to sign with one of the state's major colleges. But that isn't where the story ends because Albert Dennis is more than just a "first."

"Albert is as fine a line-man I've seen this year," said assistant coach Joe Clark, the man who recruited Dennis. "He's the best lineman in Louisiana as far as we are concerned."

What impresses football coaches and innocent bystanders most about Dennis is his size. Most 17-year-olds don't come packaged in 6-foot-5, 240-pound wrappings. And, when they do, they usually don't excel as four-sport lettermen.

"He's a tremendous physical specimen," said Clark. "He's the type of kid you would sign if you just saw him walking down the street, not knowing he played football. Not only does he have size but he's got poise."

While Dennis was building a reputation as an All-State defensive end and offensive tackle at Hammond's Greenville Park, Tulane wasn't the only school interested in his talents. Several, including Purdue, Houston and Grambling were in the running before Tulane got the nod.

"Albert will definitely be an asset to our program," Clark added. "He's still growing and surprisingly physically mature for his size. He could play either offense or defense but when you run across a boy of this size who handles himself this well the temptation to use him on defense is overwhelming."

"We're going to a pro defense beginning next year and Albert should fit in just right. He's got pro size and he's still growing."

Dennis plans to major in physical education at Tulane.

Among Top Five?

Although Dennis participated in the Louisiana Inter-scholastic Athletic and Literary Organization's District III (one which includes several New Orleans schools) his accomplishments were not exactly legendary. But they won't forget him in District III.

Champ Clark, a veteran sportscaster who has covered LIALO games for many years, claims Dennis could be "the next great star to come out of the LIALO."

"He's every bit as good as Archie Sutton (of Illinois and Minnesota Viking fame via way of Xavier Prep), Frank Cornish (of Grambling and Chicago via Carver) and Al Jenkins (Tulsa and Cleveland via St. Augustine)."

Burton of New York has a nifty 12-0-1 record while Burns is undefeated in 17 pro starts.

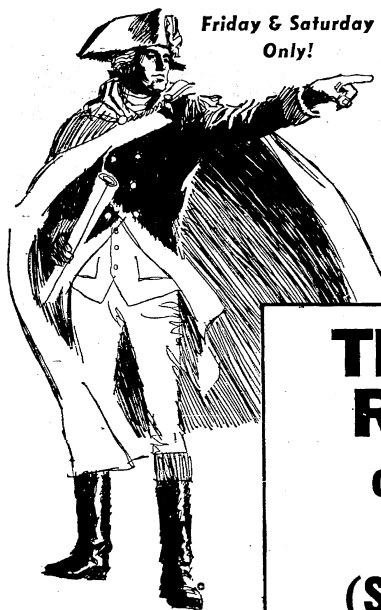

"It seems remarkable, in a sense, but he played basketball well enough to start for Greenville Park last year and they won the LIALO state title. Dennis is as smooth an operating boy as I've seen for his size."

"Oh, he made his fair share of mistakes and a lot of teams double-teamed him but his recovery and football sense more than made up for it," Clark explained.

"You know every now and then you've got to eat some corrections, but unless I'm terribly mistaken Albert Dennis should be one of the top five black athletes developed in this city."
