High Schoolers Will Run
Saturday at Southern

The best in the A, AA and AAA divisions of the Louisiana Interscholastic Athletic and Literary Organization will find their way to the campus of Southern University in Baton Rouge to compete for championship honors Saturday in the annual LIALO State Championship Meet.

Participating in Saturday's meet, which will feature only finals, will be the first and second place winners of Zone competition.

The 80-odd mile journey to SU would be worth it just to see Carver's Spencer Thomas and Rodney Milburn of Clark of Opelousas compete in their personal meet in the 120 high hurdles and 180 low hurdles. Milburn ran a 19.1 and Thomas a 19.2 in the low hurdles in the Pelican State Relays recently in Baton Rouge, and both were clocked at 14 flat in the 120 high hurdles.

There will be track "talent" in large quantities on the quality level. Andrew McKay of Greenville Park (Hammond) won the long jump with a leap of 22.10½, to better Spencer Thomas' jump of 22.8½. In the triple jump, Spencer's 48.6½, is the record across the nation this year.

Park Avenue's 440 relay team ran the fastest quarter mile in the state, 42.2, in the Pelican Relays. McKinley of Baton Rouge, Clark of New Orleans and Landry (New Orleans) are the chief competitors in the 880. Landry's Kirby Straughter in the Pelican Relays took the high jump with a 6'4" jump.

Texas Stunned by
Joe Nobis' Death

Drowned Gridder's Career
Injury Marked

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) — The drowning of Joe Nobis, University of Texas football player and brother of All-Pro linebacker Tommy Nobis, left the university's athletic community stunned and saddened Tuesday.

Nobis, 19, drowned while swimming with nine other university football players in the Colorado River just below Mansfield Dam (Lake Travis) late Monday afternoon.

"We're stunned, saddened and words come hard," said the university's athletic director and head football coach, Darrell Royal.

Royal cancelled Wednesday's football workout.

Nobis' funeral will be held at Alamo funeral home in San Antonio Wednesday at 3 p.m.

Young Nobis' football career at the university had been hampered by injuries. He was a defensive end on the freshman team last fall but spent much time on the sidelines because of a knee injury. He hurt a shoulder on the first day of spring practice and had not worked out since.

Nobis' brother was an All-American linebacker at the university and National Football League co-Rookie of the Year in 1966 with the Atlanta Falcons. He was named All-Pro after last year's season. Tommy Nobis was attending a performance at the HemisFair in San Antonio Monday night when he was called to the telephone to learn of his brother's death.

Joe Nobis was a linebacker

and offensive end at San Antonio Jefferson High School. He was selected for All-City and All-District teams and was captain and Most Valuable Player of the Jefferson team his senior year.

Nobis' body was recovered at 6:15 p.m. in about 25 feet of water. Justice of Peace Buck Smith ruled death by accidental drowning.

LIALO Track Meet Tonight at Southern

The Louisiana Interscholastic Athletic and Literary Organization's annual all-classification Track and Field Championships will get underway at Southern University Saturday evening. Clifford T. Seymour, director of sports for the organization, announced that the first event will begin Saturday night at 5:45 p.m. for A, AA, and AAA schools in the final LIALO

championship activity of the year. Among the local entries, McKinley High School of Baton Rouge is a strong favorite to cop the AAA title, with Scotlandville High given the nod as a strong deterrent to Panther championship aspirations. And a wholesale assault on the records are expected in one-day extravaganza which goes

into the state championships with records still in existence by present-day collegians which include Dell Haynes, currently a stalwart in the discus and shot-put for Southern, the Johnson Brothers — Robert and Webster — who have run on two world championship relay teams as Jaguars and who prepped at Princeton High School in Bossier Parish, Kirk Clayton of Scotlandville who ran the springs fora year at Grambling before moving on the West Coast, and Elgy Sams, who currently holds the SWAC record in the 440-yard hurdles as a member of the Southern team.

The high schoolers will go through a 17-event card, which is scheduled to end at 9:30 with the mile relay.

Prices for the meet were quoted as \$1 for adults and fifty-cents for students.

If preliminaries are needed in any events, they will be run off Saturday afternoon, but this was called doubtful by Seymour who said that the need was doubtful.

Strange Drama Unfolds in Cup Match

LONDON (AP) — A strange drama unfolded in the European Zone Davis Cup tennis tournament as Sweden and Rhodesia stood even at 1-1 in what has become a bizarre series of mystery matches.

Sweden's Ove Bengtson reportedly ran through Adrian Panayiotou 6-2, 6-4 before Rhodesia's Frank Solomon outlasted Hans Newell 2-6, 6-4, 7-5, 1-6, 7-5, Sunday, but where the matches took place is a big secret.

The best bet is somewhere in France, possibly the resort town of Biarritz.

The matches were moved from Bastard, Sweden, where anti-Rhodesian demonstrations left the courts soaked with oil and littered with eggs, iron bars and stones. Some 1,000 demonstrators were protesting Rhodesia's white minority government.

The results were announced in Nice, France, after a mysterious telephone call by persons who identified themselves as by 5-0 scores. Russia trounced Greece at Thessaloniki, U.S.S.R. Iran defeated Switzerland at Tehran, and Finland beat Portugal at Helsinki, by 4-0 scores.

Yugoslavia held a 4-0 lead over New Zealand at Zagreb when the fifth match was cancelled by darkness, and West Germany held an unimpeachable 3-1 lead over Switzerland at Koblenz, Germany, with the final match scheduled for today.

Captain Says U.S. Team Can Capture Cup

RICHMOND, Va. (AP) — "Maybe we're not just paper lions after all," said Donald Dell, U.S. Davis Cup captain, as he made an obvious effort to bridge his enthusiasm. The U.S. team had just completed a 4-0 sweep over the British Caribbean tennis team in the American zone first-round matches.

"A lot of people have said we're a great team on paper," the 30-year-old Marylander said, "but if these fellows want the cup bad enough, we can win it."

The fellows Dell was referring to with unconcealed pride and paternalism were team members Arthur Ashe, Clark Graebner, Bob Lutz and Stan Smith.

Dell's all-out effort to restore international prestige to the image of U.S. amateur tennis got off to an auspicious start. The U.S. squad took command of the British Caribbean Friday with easy singles victories by Ashe and Graebner. The Americans clinched the match with an imposing doubles win by Lutz and Smith Saturday. They cleaned the slate by crushing their Jamaican foes in the final two singles matches Sunday behind the booming receipts of Ashe, a native Richmonder, and Lutz.

The next stop on the Davis Cup circuit will be in Berkeley, Calif., May 24-26, where the U.S. team will play either Mexico or Canada.

The British Caribbean team so outclassed by the U.S. squad during the three-day match the past weekend was essentially the same on which tripped up the U.S. team 3-2 in a first round American zone match in Jamaica in 1965.

But it wasn't so much a case of the Jamaicans losing their edge as it was the U.S. team finally losing theirs.

Graebner set the pattern in the initial match Friday by completely overpowering Lumsden, 6-0, 6-1 in the Davis Cup singles debut.

"He was really sensational," said Dell, who hinted that Lutz might see more singles action.

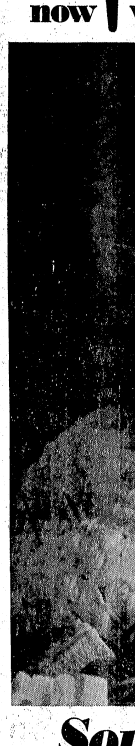

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Court of Appeals Rules St. Aug. Must be Admitted

NEW ORLEANS (AP)—The Louisiana High School Athletic Association (LHSAA) must admit all-Negro St. Augustine High School of New Orleans and stop membership discrimination, the 5th Circuit Court of Appeals ruled Wednesday in upholding a lower court order.

The appeals court declined to rule on a cross-appeal filed by St. Augustine.

The cross-appeal, filed after LHSAA took the fight on to the 5th Circuit, asked that the district court order be broadened to require immediate integration of the LHSAA and its Negro counterpart, the Louisiana Interscholastic Athletic and Literary Organization (LIALO).

In the cross-appeal, St. Augustine also asked an order against the State Board of Education, contending that the board was siding with the LHSAA in a squabble with St. Augustine over player eligibility.

The appeals court said both matters should be presented first at the district court level.

As to the LHSAA appeal, the high court said there was plenty of evidence to support "the inference that St. Augustine was denied membership on racial grounds."

"No other reasonable inference is supported by the record and no other explanation is offered to us," the court said.

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Court Upholds Order to Admit St. Augustine

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — A federal appeals court upheld Wednesday an order that the Louisiana High School Athletic Association (LHSAA) admit all Negro St. Augustine High — and stop discrimination as to membership.

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Coffee, Robertson Duel in 220 Tonight in NORD Meet of Champions

The two fastest 220 yard Kinsley High, will clash for the dasters in Louisiana prep his-first time Friday night at tory, Al Coffee of Lee High/Behrman Stadium in the head-

line event of the 19th annual NORD Meet of Champs.

The meet, expected to be the greatest in state history, will be dedicated to Ken Leithman, a prime mover in New Orleans track.

No less than four all-time state record holders, and three national leaders will participate in the meet.

The action gets under way at 7 p. m. with the first field events. The 880 relay, the first running event, will gun off 10 minutes later.

Coffee, the LHSAA sprint champ, has run the furlong in 28.7, an all-time state best for a straightaway; while

Robertson, the LIALO premier dashman, has gone 21.2 around the turn, another best-ever. Subtracting a half-second from Robertson's time to account for the turn, the two times are identical.

The two will meet earlier in the night in the 100, but here Coffee's superior start gives him a big edge in times 9.5 to 9.9.

In the mile run John McKinnon of Fair Park will attempt to better Owen Self's Louisiana record of 4:11.8. McKinnon ran 4:13.9 Monday night at the AAA meet in Baton Rouge.

Thomas holds the best mark in the triple jump in the nation, a 48-5½ inch effort, while the only record the Byrd

runner still claims.

Also in the four-lapper will be Bobby Sabague, of Redemptorist, the holder of the city mile record of 4:20.1, also run Monday night. Taylor, Aultman and Sam Reeves, both of Fortier will try to get under 4:20.

Spencer Thomas of Carver is entered in three events, the high hurdles, and the long and triple jumps. He'll be pressed by Rodney Milburn of Clark of Opelousas in the barrier event, and by Sidgy Benoit of South Cameron High in the jumps.

Thomas holds the best mark in the triple jump in the nation, a 48-5½ inch effort, while Benoit is second with a 48-1.

Milburn, a sophomore, threatens to become the greatest prep hurdler in the nation's history when he matures. Currently, he is the third fastest high and low hurdler in the nation with times of 14.9 and 19.1. If he improves just fractions Friday night, he'll take over the lead in both events.

The top half-miler in the state, Willie Bolden of Linear of Shreveport, will try to make it two in a row over Israel Rose of Landry. Bolden won the first meeting at the LIALO championships two weeks ago by burning the first 660 and holding on for a slim margin. Rose, figuring that Bolden

would tire, laid too far back, and his sprint finish fell 10 yards short.

Larry Rigdon of Nicholls may be a factor in this race. The Rebel half-miler finished a strong second in the AAA meet Monday with a 1:56.3.

Another state record holder, Jack Causey of Acadia Baptist, will go after the oldest meet record of 6:4 5-8 by Tommy Dukes of Warren Easton set in 1955. Causey leaped 6-6 earlier this year.

McKinley, anchored by Robertson, will be a heavy favorite in the quarter-mile relay. The Panther quartet has run a 41.8, a state record, and

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McKinley Wins State Title; Runs 41.8 440-Yard Relay

McKinley High School's Leslie Nickerson, Wycliff Robertson, William Vincent, and Don Buffington pooled their speed to turn in the fastest ever Louisiana school-boy 440-yard relay time of 41.8 in the LIALO Track and Field Championships at Southern University Saturday night.

And the Panthers rubbed salt into the wounds of the 21-team field of AAA entries by piling up 40 points to cop the state championship with L. B. Landry of New Orleans three-points back with 37.

Princeton High School amassed 33 points for the AA crown with Washington Parish and Plaisance each finished with 31 points, T. A. Levy 30, and Carver-DeRidder 28 points.

In the Single-A segment of the one-day track and field spectacular, Vernon High School all but dominated to score 60 points with Waverly High the runner-up with 41, and Grand Avenue close in third place with 40 points.

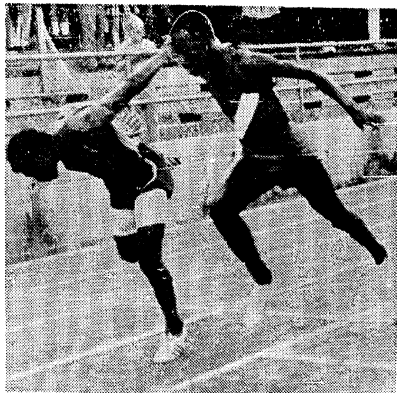
