Thomas, Milburn To Vie

Hurdlers Rodney Milburn of Clark Opelousas and Spencer Thomas of Carver-New Orleans are unquestionably the star prep attractions for Saturday's All-Classifications Louisiana Inter-scholastic Athletic and Literary Organization's Track and Field Championships to be held at Southern University.

The two timber-topping high schoolers have carried on a fabled three-year duel over the 120-yard highs and the 180 lows. Milburn has the undisputed upper hand in the series of matches.

But a new twist came about up in Knoxville at a University of Tennessee sponsored High School meet last Saturday.

Thomas broke his string of frustrating, close-wins by beating his old nemesis.

This is the final year in which the prep rivals will be able to draw a bead on each other in scholastic circles.

So look for the LIALO championships to end up a proving ground of sorts, and a real battle for the state title in the 120-yard high hurdles.

Thomas has performed his way to the designation of "one of the best all-around high school track performers in the nation," because of his talent display in the triple jump, the long jump, and in the sprints in addition to his hurdling heroics.

A sample of his versatility was evident last Saturday when he won the triple jump with a 49' 5" leap, good enough to smash the Federation national record, and the long jump with a feat of 28' 8" in addition to the hurdles triumph over Milburn.

Milburn ran a 14.2 which earned him third place in the finals after running to a winning 13.8 prelim time.

The talent display will be glittering Saturday night.

Floyd Willis of Carver-New Orleans ran a 47.5 open quarter-mile — which was good enough to earn a second place only — and looms a strong threat to capture the state crown in that event in the AAA classification.

And Charles Stewart of Shreveport's Booker T. Washington High School who has a 9.6 clocking this year in the 100-yard dash, is expected to return to form after finishing second in Knoxville with a 10.1 performance.

But Stewart will not be able to relax by a long shot.

Joe Sincere of Martyn High of New Orleans — also a 9.6 performer this season — will be in attendance — as a participant — in the championships.

And McKinley High School's Don Buffington (9.7) looms as a possible threat in the century, and is fairly rated the favorite in the 220-yard dash. Buffington has a 220 time recorded of 21.5 for the year.

Teams with the best times in the state — an individual performers — which will be competing in the LIALO meet are: the 440-yard relay team of Landry High of New Orleans (42.8); and Landry again in the 880-yard relay (1:29.7); New Orleans-Carver in the mile relay (3:21.2); Thomas in the triple jump and long jump; Sincere and Stewart in the 100; Buffington in the 220, and Willis

in the quarter-mile dash.
The parade of Champions will
begin at 5 p.m. in University
Stadium, and the first event
will get underway at 5:30 p.m.
The first running event is set
for 6 p.m.
In addition to A, AA, and
AAA championship events, high
school girls, not by classifica-
tions, will perform with their
first event scheduled for 4 p.m.

Carver Wins LIALO Title; McKinley Sets 41.6 440-Relay Record; Milburn Has 13.6

McKinley High School's super-sonic duo of Ivory Joe Davis, Kenneth Spearman, William Vincent, and Don Buffington, jetted to a best-ever 440-

yard relay time for Louisiana prepsters—a 41.6 gem—to better the old record by two-tenths seconds, at the LIALO Track and Field Championships at Southern University Saturday night.

And the same unit tied the year's fastest time of the year in the 800-yard relay, as they gunned down Scotlandville High School with a 1:27.6 feat, while

the Hornets team posted a 1:23.9 second place time.

But Carver High School of New Orleans carried off the AAA team championship, scoring 37 points to 30 for the runner-up Panthers and the Scotlandville Hornets who tied for second.

B.T. Washington — Shreveport was fourth with 26 points; Clark-Opelousas was fifth with 24 and Landry of New Orleans amassed 20 markers.

Dunbar High School of Washington took the AA team title with 41 points, and Grand Avenue High of DeQuincy posted 60 points in winning by three over Berger High of Independence which had 57 points.

Rodney Milburn, the hurdling marvel from Clark-Opelousas, set a new mark of 13.6 for AAA schools in the 120-yard high, besting his arch-rival Spencer Thomas of Carver-New Orleans who was in second place with a 13.9 feat.

L.B. Landry of New Orleans sped to a new record in the mile relay with a 3:20.4

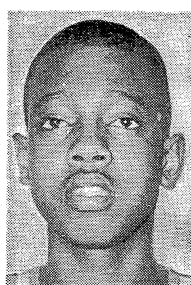

LSU Signs Wills to Track Grant

**Star Is Second Negro
Inked by Tigers**

Lloyd Wills, a 6-2, 160-pound cinder star from George Washington Carver High School and the fastest prep quartermiler in the state, penned an athletic grand-in-aid with Louisiana State University Thursday at ceremonies held at a downtown New Orleans hotel.

The 19-year old Carver lad is the second Negro athlete to be signed by LSU, and he'll join Charley Stewart of Washington of Shreveport, who earlier this year signed a track scholarship with the Tigers.

The son of Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Wills of 2233 Pauline st., Wills will major in physical education and minor in sociology.

Winner of state championships in the 440-dash and 880-yard run, Wills has one of the nation's fastest times in the quarter-mile with a 47.5 clocking, which he ran in the Southern championships at Knoxville, Tenn., earlier this spring.

He's also has a 1:55.8 in the 880-yard run in the Louisiana Inter-scholastic and Literary Organization state meet held at Southern University in Baton Rouge. He's also run a relay split of 47.3 at Knoxville when his team ran a 3:17.9 mile relay, but they were disqualified because the scratch man ran out of his lane.

We're pleased to have such an outstanding athlete and competitor as Lloyd sign with LSU," said head track coach Joe May, who signed the youngster to a National letter of intent. "He has tremendous potential in the 440 and 880 and should be an immediate asset to our mile relay team," added May.

"With Lloyd coming to LSU, we can be assured of having two outstanding quartermilers and another outstanding mile relay team," said May, who had in mind at the time Southeastern Conference 440-yard record holder Al Coffee of Baton Rouge and Johnny Carter of Alexandria.

"He's one of the best I've ever coached, and one of the most consistent runners we've ever had at Carver," said his high school coach, Enos Hicks. "Lloyd was an exceptional quartermiler and never trained for the half-mile, but he won both events at the state meet."

PARIS (AP) Dick Crealy, an obscure, 24-year-old Australian amateur, grabbed a two-to-one set lead over top-seeded Rod Laver Thursday before a thunderstorm interrupted second round matches in the French Open Tennis Championships.

Crealy, ranked fourth in his country, led the world's No. 1 player 6-3, 9-7, 2-6 in the most surprising development of the tournament on the Roland Garros courts.

America's Cliff Richey, a clay court specialist from Dallas, won the first two sets from 36-year-old Luis Ayala of Chile and had match point in the third only to let the veteran Latin slip away. Richey was leading 6-4, 6-3, 8-10, 6-6 when the rains came, but he was within a point of losing his service in the 13th game.

Meanwhile, pro Dennis Ralston of Bakersfield, Calif., and Stan Smith of Pasadena, Calif., third-ranked U. S. player, swept into the third round and America furnished four of the last 16 remaining ladies.

Ralston won a strange match from Patricio Rodriguez of Chile, 6-2, 6-4, 0-6, 6-4. The hot-tempered American seemed to lose interest after winning the first two sets, serving double-faults and making loose shots to drop 12 games in a row. But he rallied in the fifth set.

Smith, a member of the U.S. Davis Cup team, scored an easy 6-3, 6-1, 6-2 triumph over Patrick Holmbergen of Belgium. Arthur Ashe, Jr., the U.S. Open champion, advanced Wednesday.

Richey's sister, Nancy, the defending ladies' champion, and hard-hitting Julie Heldman of New York, the recent Italian winner, both won in straight sets and joined Billie Jean King of Long Beach, Calif., and Rosemary Casals of San Francisco in the round of 16.

Miss Richey downed Mrs. Gail Chanfrau of France, the former Gail Sherriff of Australia, 6-4, 6-4. Miss Heldman eliminated another American, Tulane freshman Linda Tuero of Metairie, La., 6-3, 6-1. Misses Richey and Heldman clash in the quarter-finals if they survive the next round.
