TWO LIALO'S LOOM HIGH

Trojans, Bulldogs Look Like Powers

If last week's gridiron performances are true indicators of what can be expected this year among the berthholders in the two local Louisiana Inter-scholastic Athletic and Literary Organization districts, the state championship could very easily remain on the west bank with Coach Henry Crosby's Lincoln Trojans, and the Clark Bulldogs could dominate their District 5.

The Bulldogs have seemingly taken over after St. Augustine's Purple Knights withdrew to seek their fame in other competition.

Lincoln looked good in its 27-7 romp over McKinley from Baton Rouge, while Clark's 21-12 victory over the Bethune Cougars in Shreveport is well deserving of a share and equal billing in the LIALO spotlight.

Conrad Noel and Glenn Brooks were the power guns in the Trojans' win. Noel scored on runs of 67 and 88 yards and Brooks' tally was a 30 yard jaunt.

Clark hit pay dirt in the second quarter. Barry Marquez went 85 yards on a kickoff return and Wilbert Smith went in from the five. Everett Route, a candidate for honors at the quarterback slot again this season, tossed an 18-yard pass to Lavon Newell for a touchdown, and Clark picked up another six points on a 45 yard gallop by halfback Warren Roland. Route had a perfect evening, kicking three for three in the PAT's. Lincoln's Rodney Zeno, placement specialist, had three for four.

Cohen's Green Hornets had their debut spoiled by 33rd Avenue (Gulfport, Miss.). It could not have been that Coach Harold Millon's charges were overconfident, judging from the scoring. We would like to think that Cohen was not just ready, the Mississippi club was, but the Hornets will improve as the season progresses.

Booker T. Washington's Lions were held to a scoreless tie by St. Augustine's Purple Knights, which Knights return to the LIALO ranks this week as guests of Coach Turner Thomas' Landry Bucs at 7:30 p. m. Saturday at Behrman Stadium. Thomas will be making his debut as head coach at Landry and the Knights may be in trouble. St. Augustine, in a non-league till last season, put a 28-0 defeat on the Bucs which they certainly would like to avenge.

McDonogh 35's Roneagles will be idle this week. McDonogh dropped a 19-12 count to Westside in Amite last week, and Martyn suffered a 30-2 setback by C.M. Washington in Lake Charles.

Two new faces have been added to the LIALO leagues, 3 and 5, in the Greater New Orleans area, and should create new interest in the prep gridiron action generally. They are Greenville Park of Hammond, and Central Memorial of Bogalusa. Central defeated Peabody, 28-6. Central and McKinley will tangle Friday night in Baton Rouge, while Greenville Park will try to entertain West Livingston at Denham Springs.

Several Changes Made in Prep Loop

With the Southwestern Athletic Conference opening its 1968 football season this weekend, the Louisiana Interscholastic Athletic and Literary Organization will have to share the spotlight with the college crews.

Since last season, several changes have been made in the LIALO, beginning with the naming of a new state commissioner of athletics; the shifting of coaches among Districts 3 and 5 in the Greater New Orleans area and the addition of two clubs to each of the local districts.

Wilbert "Flip" Huey, athletic director at Lowery High School at Donaldsonville, has been elected LIALO state commissioner to succeed Senrab Barnes of Shreveport.

Central Memorial Spartans of Bogalusa and the Greenville Park Hornets of Hammond have been added to Districts 3 and 5. The Spartans, coached by John J. Piper, won the District 3 championship last season and the Hornets finished last in the same league.

The Spartans have been assigned to a berth in District 5 which is composed of Clark, the defending champion Carver, Landry and Martyn. The Hornets coached by John Williams, will share District 3 berths with Lincoln, the LIALO state champion, Cohen, Booker T. Washington, and McDonough.

35. Vacancies came in the two leagues when St. Augustine's Purple Knights withdrew and Xavier Prep dropped interscholastic athletic competition completely.

Hal Winn has been assigned the head coaching chores at Clark to succeed Turner Thomas, who has taken over the top job at Landry.

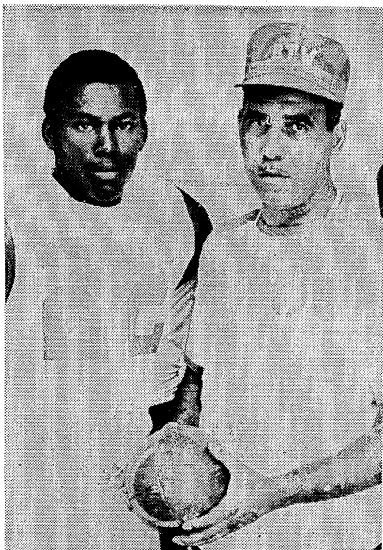
