## Clark Gets Early Start

### Winners Extend Streak to Six Games

McDonogh 35's Roneagles bowed to the potent Clark Bulldogs, 35-0, in a double-homecoming game here Friday in Tad Gormley Stadium.

C Coach Turner Thomas' Bulldogs scored twice in the first and third quarters, once in the second, and an Eagle back was trapped in his own end zone for a safety. When the dust of battle had settled, Clark remained unbeaten and had extended its win streak to six. The Roneagles left the field still searching for their first win of the season.

Thomas Lavigne, Phil Barre, Percy Dobard, Wilburt Smith and Mervin Williams provided the scoring power for the Bulldogs while Clark's defensive unit contained the Eagle backs throughout the contest. McDonogh drove 40 yards to the Bulldogs' seven in the fourth quarter, but were unable to put a scoring play together.

Friday the 13th proved to be not only unlucky for the Roneagles, but also for the Bulldogs' Enos Hick, a defensive back. Hicks, a speedster, broke loose for a 53-yard touchdown jaunt in the third quarter only to have it nullified by a clipping penalty.

Lavigne scored the Bulldogs' "alpha" and "omega" touchdowns. Lavigne went in from the two in the first quarter to cap a 40-yard drive, and from the four in the third quarter to top a 34-yard Bulldog offensive. Lavon Newell booted the Bulldogs' final point after touchdown to end the scoring.

With :52 seconds remaining in the initial quarter, Dobard tossed an 18-yard touchdown aerial to Mervin McWilliams, and Route booted the PAT which put the Bulldogs out front 13-0 at the end of the first quarter.

Barre plunged over from the two for the lone Clark touchdown in the second quarter, and Route's kick was good. The half closed with Clark leading 20-0.

In the third quarter McDonogh defensive guard James Bridges pounced on Route's fumble on the McDonogh three to delay the Bulldogs' scoring. McDonogh quarterback Lidel Greenup, who likes to run with the ball when not passing it, picked up 17 yards to the 20 from where McDonogh was forced to kick. On the following play, Smith broke loose for his 50-yard touchdown run. Route's kick from placement was partially blocked.

Then followed Roneagle QB and Greenup's "history-making" return of the kickoff. After getting to the 20, Greenup attempted to evade Clarke tacklers, reversed his field and was chased off the field of play in his end zone for a safety.

Clark will meet Landry Wednesday at 7 p.m. in City Park in a crucial LIALO District 5 tilt, and McDonogh and Lincoln will vie in a District III contest Saturday, 7 p.m., at West Jefferson.

## Cohen Scalps Central for Victory, 32 to 13

Hornets Turned in a  
Fine Effort

The Cohen Bulldogs last week turned in a brilliant performance against the Central Spartans of Bogalusa to upset the visitors from the papermill town, 32-13, in an interdistrict LIALO contest.

Coach Harold Millon's Hornets, defending District III champions, had been in search of a win since their first game.

Going into the Bogalusa contest, Cohen had dropped games to Clark, 9-0, and Henderson, 14-6, in nondistrict play, and a 20-14 district tilt to the Lincoln Trojans.

Hornet quarterback William Gennings sparked Cohen to victory. Gennings passed for two touchdowns and scored twice,

and for his performance Gennings has earned himself our "LIALO Back of the Week" designation.

Coach Winston Burns' Lions had to come from behind to turn back coach Ray Webb's Martyn Indians, 18-7, for a Washington homecoming victory which could have been anybody's game until the last 50 seconds when Johnny Hankton, one of Washington's speedsters, broke loose on two plays for 26 and 25 yards for the winning touchdown.

Penalties hurt the Indians, who have in Michael Stewart one of the best running backs in this league. Stewart scored the first touchdown of the game on a 14-yard run. Lucien Dupard scored two touchdowns for the Lions on six- and five-yard runs, and was the workhorse throughout the game.

In a double homecoming tilt, Clark rolled over the McDonough Roneagles, 35-0, to extend the Bulldogs' unbeaten season standing to 6-0. Coach Turner Thomas' Phil Barre, Percy Dobard, Wilburt Smith and Mervin Williams provided the scoring power, but for Bulldog defensive back Enos Hicks Friday the 13th proved to be indeed "unlucky." Hicks broke loose on a 53-yard touchdown jaunt only to have his effort nullified by a clipping penalty. Lavigne picked up two touchdowns on runs of two and four yards, and Dobard passed 18 yards to McWilliams for a touchdown. Smith got his six points on a 50-yard scamper.

District play will take the spotlight this week among the two LIALO-based leagues in the New Orleans area.

Clark will open this week's schedule in a District V tilt Wed., 7 p. m., with the Landry Bucs in Tad Gormley. Coach Curtis Miller's charges will be playing their first district game.

On Saturday, two games are scheduled. At 7 p. m., Lincoln will be the choice in a District III game with the McDonough Roneagles in West Jefferson, and the Carver Rams will meet Martyn, 7 p. m., Tad Gormley, in a District V tilt.

The game of the week will be on Sunday between the Cohen Hornets and Washington Lions. Coach Winston Burns' Lions need a win to keep pace in the District III race with Lincoln, and will find a troublesome and potent opponent in Cohen.

Clark Gets Early Lead

Barre Scores Twice for the Victors

Coach Turner Thomas' Clark Bulldogs kept their win streak going and annexed the Louisiana Interscholastic Athletic and Literary Organization's District V crown Wednesday night with an impressive, 24-14, victory over the Landry Buccaneers in Tad Gormley Stadium.

The Bulldogs scored twice in the first quarter and once in the second for a commanding, 18-0, lead at intermission.

On the third play after the opening kickoff Bulldog back Phil Barre broke through the middle and sprinted 66 yards for Clark's first touchdown, with 11:14 remaining. The Bulldogs struck again on a 55-yard sustained drive with Thomas Lavigne going in from the one.

Clark stopped a Buc drive on the Clark three and then the Bulldogs drove for their third touchdown in the half. Barre plunged over from one yard out.

Coach Curtis Miller's Bucs came back charged up in the third quarter and scored with 10:25 remaining. Turner Saunders plunged over from the two to cap a sustained drive which was set up when Landry recovered a Bulldog fumble on the Clark 23. Kirby Straughter passed to Kenneth Walters for the point to reduce Clark's advantage, 18-7. Clark reclaimed its scoring advantage after recovering a Landry fumble on the Bucs' 33. Wilbert Smith picked up one yard for the touchdown, as Clark went out front, 24-7, going into the final 12 minutes of action.

## **St. Augustine Moves to Fifth in AAA**

St. Augustine of New Orleans vaulted into fifth place in the Triple-A Top Ten, Natchitoches took over the No. 1 spot in Double-A and Vanderbilt of Houma regained the top ranking in Class A in this week's Associated Press prep football ratings.

De La Salle of New Orleans, the only unbeaten, untied team in Triple-A continued at the top of the poll Wednesday while St. Augustine kept its grip on first place in Class B.

St. Augustine, the all-Negro school which was ordered admitted to the integrated Louisiana High School Athletic Association by a federal district court judge last July, jumped

into the No. 5 spot in Triple-A after beating St. Aloysius High 26-7 last Friday.

The Purple Knights, who won the 1965 and 1966 state championships of the Louisiana Interscholastic and Literary Organization — Negro equivalent of the LHSAA — were rated tenth in the preseason Triple-A poll this fall but dropped out of the rankings after their 26-game victory skein was snapped by Washington of Lake Charles, an LIALO school. St. Augustine's game with St. Aloysius was the school's first with an LHSAA member.

The Purple Knights collide this Saturday with the powerful Holy Cross Tigers, who ranked third in this week's AP poll. A crowd of 25,004 is expected for the meeting in New Orleans'

Tad Gormley Stadium between the two teams.

Lake Charles LaGrange moved into the No. 2 place in Triple-A this week, followed by Holy Cross, Airline of Bossier City, St. Augustine, Neville of Monroe, Jesuit of New Orleans, Byrd of Shreveport with South Lafourche of Galliano and Woodlawn of Shreveport tied for the No. 9 spot.

## Clark Has Won Crown

District III Contest Will Go Down to Wire

The shadows are lengthening on the '67 Louisiana Inter-scholastic and Literary Organization gridiron district season, and before many more moons have come and gone, district winners will find themselves in arena, regional and championship contests.

Coach Turner Thomas' Clark Bulldogs lived up to pre-season predictions and Clark's announcement that they would "take over domination of District V," and this they have done. The Bulldogs have tucked away the LIALO V crown in the trophy room and are looking forward to their coming play-offs.

Clark, in LIALO play in the Greater New Orleans area, is undefeated. Seven opponents have fallen before the Bulldogs — Henderson of New Iberia, 20-0; Cohen, 9-0; Booker T. Washington, 7-6; Carver, 20-19; Martyn, 21-13; McDonogh 35, 35-0, and Landry, 24-14.

The Bulldogs still have Lincoln and Scotlandville to play, but regardless of the outcome, Clark is the king-pin in District V, and coach Thomas deserves all congratulations in directing the Bulldogs to their district championship in his sophomore year as a head coach. Clark finished the '66 season in second place to St. Augustine's Purple Knights, who are no longer berthholders in the LIALO. Speculation is that had the Knights chose to remain in the LIALO league, the Bulldogs would have had to satisfy themselves as the "bridesmaid" and not the "bride," but the Thomasmen said that this is debatable. Word is that Clark is also trying to follow St. Augustine's move and leave the LIALO ranks.

While the Bulldogs won the District V crown with a 3-0 record, it is evident that in District III the contest will go down to the final wire.
