
#### THE HUMAN STAIRWAY

#### ALLEN PARISH TRAINING SCHOOL Oakdale, La.

The Allen Parish Training School was founded in 1922 by Professor T. J. Simpson, then principal. The school was established as an industrial high school for the Colored Citizens of Oakdale.

In 1933 Mr. T. E. Butler became principal of the Allen Parish Training School. Under his leadership the school has developed into a modern, well equipped plant of four buildings and also have in an application for priority for an auditorium, gymnasium and a home sconomics cottage.

The Agricultural Department, of which Mr. Butler heads, is rated as one of the best departments in the state. In 1936 he received a "Key" as a reward for Master Teacher of Agriculture. Four years he produced ranking agricultural judging team in the state.

Mr. T. E. Butler is a graduate of Southern University, Class of '32, majoring in Agricultural Education and minoring in Science. He has also done further study: Post-graduate work at Tuskegee Institute, graduate work at the University of Illinois and Michigan State College. He is a member of the Phi Beta Sigma Fraternity.

#### Miss Maude Washington, of Grambling, La., Our Sponsor

Miss Washington has been on the faculty of the Allen Parish for five years.

She came to fill a vacancy left by the teacher of the third grade. The next session she was given the fourth grade for two years. Then the fifth grade, then the sixth grade.

Our class with dignity was buried well. Myrtle was the one to portray this part.

And while we have thus given a brief historical sketch of our high school career, we trust that the ending of this our first lesson will be the beginning of another life that will enable us to build upon the foundations laid while students of this school.



Victory now means freedom from the dreaded study and our examinations.

As the last fatal hour arrives, and the final examination raises our sinister heads, the attack of the seniors is brave and well organized.

The organization of the senior class was noteworthy with the following list of officers in charge; Gloria Bee Braxton, President, Ola Mae Wooten, Vice President; Geneva Estelia White, Secretary; Dorothy Marie Lollie, Treasurer and Mr. W. P. Moore, Sr. Sponsor. The results of concentration is apparent. To a man and to a woman — we seniors emerge victoriously.

The strenuous preparation for battle made our cast more and more familiar with study, and a blessing in disguise and every body is happy.

The play ends in a burst of glory, with flowers, music and congratulations — in short, graduation exercises; and we have the well-known and ever popular, happy ending.

As the days crept slowly along we were gradually smoothed off and polished by the slow-moving machine whose sole business is the manufacture of young men and women out of the now material with which the foeder is replenished each fall. Our first year was almost entirely spent in rubbing off our grooness and in getting euipped for our part in the great word that lay before us.

Upon returning the next October we all felt very big. Why should we not? Wasn't it our

second year in high school?

Some new passengers joined us, namely: Mattie Loo Evans and Ruthell Gray, and some old ones dropped out, namely: Mary Alice March, Mary Nell Blair, Joe Barns, Ray Youngblood, Louise Jones a nd Henry J. Anderson. It was then that we laid aside our first year meekness, and assumed a bold garb. This year began a study of science, and we thought it would be beyand doubt our easiest study.

Our great time is the present. We have now arrived in the midst of the third chapter. This year we took up a new study, geometry. Mrs. Crawley, through her patience and skill, taught us this subject. Here we made our most brilliont marks, although at times we would change our recitations into picnics, concerts or what else we would decide to do of our own accord. It was then that the biology class encountered that awful monster, Mr. Crawley, but after all, with him as a monster, he came to be a beloved necessity to all of the tenth grade.

We have come through to the eleventh gradethe happiest-yet saddest year of all. Having arrived, at length, to our Sonior year, we have turned ourselves industriously to rounding out the high school course. Out of the 25 passengers we have now dwindled down to 11, some dropping out this year to the armed forces. Nevertheless, we are graduating, as we think, the best of all classes. As dignified seniors our class was duly organized with the following officers: President Luther Elgra Thompson and Secretary-Treasurer Doatrice Lagene Washington, who, by their courtesy and perseverance, have done much toward advancing in the interest of the class and in bringing our ship safe to port. We also selected our class colors, the gold and the blue.

We were given our usual doses of algebra and English this year. Not at all because it was necessary for us to have the subjects, but because they were scheduled for the last years. It is now that we come to the conclusion that English is not the easiest study, and that, after all, the innumerable written lessons, as reuired by Miss Hendrix, were a means of forcing us to learn even that which was hard.

And now we have come to the fourth and greatest year in the history of the class; we are seniors (at last). With the gaining of this title, we began to take curselves more seriously. As the year grow to a close, we were positively dizzy with dignity.

The organization of the senior class was noteworthy, the following officers were in charge: Hamp Williams, prexy; Stephen Sterling, viceprexy; Marguerite Altemus, secretary; Willie Philline, treasurer.

Th social events were of marked brilliance. Those most worthy of note were: Junior-Senior Prom, Banquet or Senior Prom, Children's Day, and Commencement dance.

Several seniors gained the honor roll such as: Melba Bernard, Susie Burch, Onita Ricard, David Lovely, Hamp Williams, Faye Eugenia Burns, Doris Fields, Audry Grover, Bernadine Daniels.

Then we were busy people: moetings were held. In some of the meetings, a class song, a class will and a motto was adopted. And at the end of four years the principal announced us eligible for "citizenship." By way of appropriate celebration a strange ceremony, known as commencement, will be hold. Speeches will be made, for no particular reason; songs will be sung, including the aforementioned class song. And scrolls, called diplomas, will be given out in a good time will be had by all (aside from nervousness).

The next period settlement takes place in the future. For some of us are destined to become famous. As this history comes to a close, we take this opportunity to say to the faculty of McKinley High and the people of the town will long remember that famous class of "44."



The school is now a state accredited and approved high school, with the special departments: Agriculture; Home Economics; Science; Library; Music; School Band. Eight elementary teachers, five high school teachers and one instructor.

October 14, 1941 marked the opening of Chatham Negro High School.

When the doors opened, we, twenty in number, marched in full pledged sophomores from schools of other parishes and communities. Remembering the days of our own greenness, we recognized the title which gave us the duty and honor of being the first group of the school to command. We gave a wild welcome to those green and fresh seckers of knowledge — the Freshmen. We did welcome them daily and nightly and cuased them to suffer great things. We were busy throughout the session, becoming adjusted to rules and assisting in buying school equipment. Thus ended our sophomore year.

At the beginning of our Junior year, we be-came more cultured and refined, for we realized that now we were upper-classmen. Two members were added to this band, thus, increasing our number to twenty-two. Entertaining the Seniors of 1943 at thee Junior-

#### THE CLASS HISTORY

Now the history of the Class of '44, of Jonesbero-Hodge Colored High School of the town of Jonesboro, Louisiana, is in this wise: It seems that four years ago on a certain September morning, a number of dark children were seen sneaking in the direction of Jonesboro Colored High. Our hats were pulled so low so no one could see our faces. No wonder we were so bashful. It was our first days as freshmen. As freshmen we were really green, green as the grass in the spring time. We were exhausted and nervous but in good spirit.

The first day represents dihe loss of pencils and gettign acquainted. It was really painful when our upper classmen yelled personal advice from the windows of the Sentor Class. It was difficult for us to become accustomed to the changing of classes and a teacher for each class. These hardships did not last long, however, for we soon became acquainted with more students an dlearned the ways of school. We weer invited to several socials given by upper classmen. Thus ended our freshman year at Jonesboro High.

When the school opened in October 6, 1941, we marched in as full-fledged Sophomores. To show we had learned well during our freshman year and were ready to give our spuport to our best ability. Miss Vera Morgan was chosen from our class to reign as Miss Jonesboro on Homecoming Day. Miss Helen Deloise Kimp, on May Day, was May queen. Miss Mazine Adams brought honor to the class for her writing of postry, and such letter men as Leslie Alexander, Dennis Coleman, Thomas J. Leonard, Willie McConnell and Andrew J. Watkins brought honor in the field of sports. At the end of our Sophomore year, the banner of our service to our school was really high and in September, 1942, we entered

at the Junior and Senior Prom. At this lovely entertainment we moved about with joyful hourts because we knew then that we were the Seniors of the Class of 1944.

A mingling of joy and sorrow greeled us during the first months as Seniors in the early days of September nad Ocotber, 1943. With gay spirits and youthful hearts and joyous expectations we greeted and welcomed our principal, Mr. J. R. Wilson. A dark cloud hovered over our class during the first of the school year. Our boys were called to serve in the Armed Forces of the United States. We mention with honor the names of: Barnell N. Walker, Lisbon Starks, Leslie Lee Alexander, Dennis Coleman and Thomas Leonard. During our last days here at Jonesboro High, Principal Wilson brought us safely to the shores of high school graduation.

It is fitting at this stage to express our appreciation to Principal Wilson for the interest he manifested in our class during our last days as Seniors. After complying with the rules and regulations of a war-time education during the nine months of our Senior year here at Jonesboro High. We feel confident that we have made a definite contribution to our Alma Mater, equal to that of any graduating class that has gone on before us. And now with hearts full of gratitude to our principal and teachers for their excellent guidance they have given us. Two years passed and we were successfully takin gon a new dignity, that of Juniors. We also took back into our folds Roberta Lewis and Eloise Larkin. However, we lost uiet a number. Gad Wilmore, Mitchell Robinson, Caesar Lamb and Norman Norwood were called into the armed forces. Our class had decreased to a very small group, yet we were a happy band. Up to this time Mrs. Harvey had done her best to hold us together as a loving family.

On October 11, 1943, thirteen hard laboring seniors walked into Rayville Colored High School to take on the grand dignity. Being in the best of health and mentally alert James Smith and Josse McCaa were inducted into the United States Army. Later Katie Lee Robinson left because of illness, which reduced our number to 10, to complete the career begun four years ago.

The journey has not been pleasant all the way, however, we have done our best. The reward is not given to the swift, but to the one who endures to the end, therefore we chose this motto: "He convers whoo endures."

Singleton, Sarah Talbert, Araminta Turner, J. W. Turner, Rubin Walter, Leon Wilson, Geneva Wilson, Bernice Marshall, Mozella Williams, J. B. Oliver.

At first, everything seemed new and strange to us. To the casual eye, we seemed merely a group of boys and girls, but to the trained eye droppe dout to pursue something that, at the time, seem to them easier. Sarah Talbert, Mary Lee Mayo, Mary D. Foster, Annie Bell May, and Araminta Turner thought it would be much more fascinating to get married and rear a family. J. B. Oliver, Essie B. Singleton and Georgianna Baker moved away. Lucille Jones and Clarence Newsome decided to try to make some money. We were very sorry to part with these people, but we knew we must climb on without them.

Mourning over the loss of these classmates did not last long, for as we reached the second round of the ladder, two very friendly sojourners joined our ranks. These were Ruthie Lee Alexander and Herman Williams. As we traveled merrily along, we were suddenly saddened by the loss of several of our classmates, who could not even complete the year. Johnnie Butler began to believe in the slogan, "Join the Navy and see the world," so he put his age up, joined the Navy, and is seeing the world.

Death, always the unwelcome but inevitable reaper, came into two of the homes of our community, and carried away the fathers of three of our classmates. This caused them to have to move to other places of abode. These were A. C. Jones, Thomas Lee Jones and Harvey Ayrch. Sadly and reluctantly, we bade them farewell and went on our way.

The summer passed swiftly, and feeling ourselves fully equipped for the climb, we approached the third round of the ladder. As we reached
the starting place, we realized that two of our
classmates had failed to meet us there. Bennie
Mae Salter and Annie Mae Stapleton had taken
unto themselves husbands, and were too busy
with household duties to even think of us. As
we climbed, the ascent became steeper and
steeper, but we were not to be discouraged by
difficulty, so we traveled on. At this point two
very charming girls joined our ranks. They were
Cora Lee Thomas and Fannie Mae Johnson. J.
W. Turner felt that he was not strong enough-to
continue, so he dropped out.

As the war became wider and wider in scope, it seemed inevitable that some of our group would be needed to protect old glory. So, during the summer, five of our young men were called to the colors. They were not to achieve the glorious heights for which we had striven so long. Ben Porter, Leon Wilson, Rubin Walter and Albert Robinson, Jr., chose to exhibit their bravery in the Navy. Herman Williams, who did not like water, chose the Army.

Though saddened by the departure of our boys, we realized that we who were left here must ascend the final round of the ladder. Happiness mingled with our sadness—happiness over the fact that this was our last year. The goal for which we had striven was now in view.

Before we had gone very far, Lottie Mas-Vaughn, who had been with us in Grammar School, came to complete the journey with us. The climb was ato steep for Fannie Mas Johnson, so she decided she could go no farther.

We regret to leave dear old Richland, but we must. As we go, we shall take her ideals and teachings with us. Looking back upon our stay heer will always be one of our greatest pleasures.



#### CLASS HISTORY

It was the twenty-seventh day of September, 1940, a calm, peaceful, autumnal day, radiant with the sunshine of hope, cheer and joyous promise that the good ship Union Parish Training School stood at anchor at the wharf of a new school year.

It was the same old ship that had carried many passengers to safe harbors in the land of great wisdom, but this day was a gala day in its history and many people gazed upon it in wonder as they watched the twenty-one beautiful and charming young ladies and seven bold and dashing young gentlemen as they so happily stepped aboard, for it was rumored that they were about to set sail over new and untried waters in a quest for the Fountains of Perfect Understanding.

As the ship stood at anchor on that eventful morning of September, the passengers began to arrive; and as I was the first to be enrolled upon the list of passengers to me was entrusted the important task of writing the log of the voyage that even then, they all realized was to be the most important of their lives. I had scarcely finished the task of placing my signature upon the ship register, when a companion joined me, a girl whose name was Mae Dessa Gatson, who sidled with me through the eighth grade cruise among the island of smaller learning, and who I was glad to learn was to join us in this larger voyage.

We were both congratulating ourselves upon the mutual pleasure of longer companionship together, when we turned to welcome a third comer, none other than Eula D. Fugerson, who had come from a distant city to take passage with us. We peeped over her shoulder as she wrote her name and were very much surprised to decipher the letters that she wrote. We had heard of the young lady before, and had known of her many pranks, so while we knew we would not

We were naturally very enthusiastic and asked many eager questions of our captain as to the incidents of our voyage and its probable length, and was assured that if we were persevering and diligent in our studies we should easily reach our destination at the end of four years. So it was with very hopeful hearts and smiling faces; that we bade our parents and friends good-bye nad waved our handkerchiefs from the deck at those left behind in the grammar grades, as we steamed away from the wharf and out of the harbor, actually embarked for a four years' absence on our voyage of high school life.

We were young and socially inclined so it did not take us long to become acquainted with our fellow passengers or to feel very much at home with the pilot, the captain, the stewardess and even the porter. Our fears of shipwreck were entirely wiped away in the assurance that so able a staff of seamon had us in their charge.

There were naturally a few cases of sea sickness and various ones were tempted to throw up algebra, geometry and other disagreeable dishes and toss some of their best belongings overboard in this of rough sea.

We noticed at the outset of the voyage that the stream upon which we had set sail was comparatively narrow and sheltered, but using our field glasses, we could see Louis Roberts, Ruby Lee Braggs, Louannie Ford, Ruby Warren, Catherine Owens, Mildred Brown, Betty Mae Simms, Ida Louise Ballinger, Clara Bell West, George McGough, Claudie Wilson, Darline Williams, Charles Williams and Sterling Jones.

The captain explained to us that the voyage of High School Life was in reality to be over four seas, though the four bodies of water were so closely joined together that they seemed but one immense sea. He informed us further, that we had just entered upon the first and smallest of these, which was called Freshman Sea.

The usual intimacy of ship board soon sprang up between us voyagers and we have been loyal shipmates ever since we sailed over Freshman Sea and received our checks of identification from the purser almost before we knew anything. Then some of our members became sea-sick and were cast overboard, none other than Claudie Wilson, Johnnie Lee Evans, Lucus Gatson, L. C. Gafford, Ruby Warren, Sailie B. Barnes, Marjorie Armstrogn, Margie Barnes, Clara Bell West, Reatha Williams and Mannie Bockton.

Now it so happens that this land to which they had come was ruled by one known as Prof. Haywood Berry, a professor of much wisdom, and the old ship rocked on and another group became soc-sick.

These were Mildred Roberts, Lewis Roberts, Clarence Ross, George McGough, Irean Caldwell, Madessa Gatson, Ruby Loo Braggs, Charles Williams, Wilmer Bridges, and it came to pass in the same year that the class did sit down, that an artist of much skill should make of them a picture of great beauty; but when it was done and their eyes fell upon that which was said to be like unto their faces, disgust was upon the faces of the whole class and they were much angry; for behold it was like nothing on the earth nor under the earth nor on the face of the angry deep. And the whole number at the end of the second year was 20.




