High-Flying Lions Tip Off  
This Week's LIALO Slate

Washington's league-leading Lions, 21-0, should go the distance and again win the District 3 crown in Louisiana Interscholastic Athletic and Literary Organization competition before moving into zone and regional playoffs in their crusade for the much desired state championship.

Coach Theodore "Abbie" Washington will put the Lions' unbeaten record on the line Tuesday when they meet W. L. Cohen's Green Hornets in the B.T.W. gym. Tipoff is 6:30 p.m. The Hornets are still looking for their first win over Washington this season, having lost four times to the high-flying Lion cagers.

The Hornets are not to be taken lightly for Cohen has a scrappy, well-balanced team headed by Aaron James, Joseph Williams, Al Connors, Stan Derterville and Ronald Crier, who will probably be Coach Robert Bocage's starters.

Washington's versatile five is made up of Capt. Kenneth Walker, Bruce Seals, Milton Cooper, James Williams and Donald Bernard.

Also on Tuesday, Clark and Carver will square off in the Rams' gym. Carver edged Laney 77-72 the last time out, with George Shaw pumping in 28 points. The Rams are out to clip the Bulldogs and avenge an earlier loss to Clark, 84-60. Lonnie Hammond, Merlin Williams and Lavon Newell lead the Bulldogs.

Carver and Booker T. Washington have a 3:30 p.m. engagement Friday at the Lions' gym, and McDonogh 35's Roneagles have a LIALO District 3 tilt with Cohen, 6:30 p.m. in the Hornets' nest.

## Shift Includes BR McKinley, Five New Orleans AAA Schools

The Louisiana High School Athletic Association's executive committee opened the doors to 34 Louisiana Interscholastic Athletic and Literary Association members here Saturday.

Included among the predominantly Negro high schools admitted was McKinley, of Baton Rouge, the first LIALO member in this area to shift to the LHSAA.

Until Saturday the only Negro high school member of the LHSAA was St. Augustine of New Orleans, which gained admittance through the court. Most of the LHSAA member schools are integrated but it has, heretofore, been mainly an all-white school organization.

**Temporary Assignments**

Unlike 14 of the other new members, McKinley will not participate in spring sports, choosing to begin its first LHSAA competition in September. Each of these schools received a temporary district assignment, subject to change at the annual meeting (May 15-16 here) after the reclassification committee has submitted an over-all plan.

The other new members will

not be designated districts until the annual meeting, dates for which were determined Saturday by the executive committee.

Other Baton Rouge schools approved for membership were Tara High, expected to be completed by September, and Episcopal High, which must supply its enrollment figures before actually being accepted and beginning competition in District 8-B.

In all, 44 schools were admitted, including Belle Chasse, a former LHSAA member.

In order to place five former LIALO schools from New Orleans in districts, the executive committee had to revamp District 4-AAA, comprised of public schools in the Greater New Orleans area.

**New AAA District**  
The action included creating a new Triple-A district, 3-AAA. It will include Abramson, Cohen, Easton, Fortier, Landry, McDonogh, Nicholls and L. W. Higgins. Cohen and Landry, LIALO schools, and Higgins are the new LHSAA members.

Remaining in 4-AAA are East Jefferson, Kennedy, West Jefferson and Chalmette. Added to

the district were LIALO members Carver, Clark and Booker T. Washington while Behrman of Walker, a new New Orleans school, will complete the group.

Other immediate district assignments included:

Washington of Lake Charles, 2-AAA; Boston of Lake Charles, 4-AA; Plaquemine of Opelousas, 4-B (track only); Grambling of Ruston, 1-A (both track and baseball); Belle Chasse, 7-A; Alexandria Senior High, 7-AAA; Holy Rosary Institute, of Lafayette, 5-A (track), 2-A (baseball); James Stephens, Ville Platte (3-A track) (2-A baseball); McDonogh 35, 7-A.

Of this group Washington, Boston, Plaquemine and Holy Rosary and McDonogh 35.

**Other Approvals**

Admitted but not assigned districts because they had no representatives present were St. Scholastica, all-girls school from Covington; Second Ward of Edgard, Silliman of Clinton and Valley Forge of Amite. Also admitted were Salmen of Slidell, and Project 63 of Shreveport.

Other schools approved for LHSAA membership, but which will not begin competition until September, include the following LIALO schools:

In other business, the LHSAA executive committee discussed plans for its state high school basketball tournaments — the boys Top Twenty, March 4-5-6-7, and the girls Sweet Sixteen, Feb. 25-26-27. Both will be played in Rapides Parish Coliseum at Alexandria.

The general meeting of the association, postponed from its original date of this weekend, is slated in mid-May. Headquarters will be The Bellemont Motel, where Friday and Saturday's executive committee meetings were held. General and class meetings during the annual convention will be at Istrouma High School.

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla. (AP) — A cute little cupcake from Florida is trying to correlate race car drivers with such prose and poetry stalwarts as Shelley, Byron, Keats and Dunne.

How's she doing? "Very well," says Cheryl Johnson, a blue-eyed blonde whose 5-foot-5, 115-pound figure has walked into the victory circle at beauty contests at least 19 times.

Miss Johnson is one of eight "racestoppers" employed by the Union Oil Co. of California to brighten the press boxes at auto races. Each is a professional model and each has a string of beauty titles as long as their slender, delicate arms.

### Hornets Tip Lions, 63-59

Snaps Washington Streak  
At 21 Games

Forward Larry McKenzie's layup with 10 seconds left started Cohen to a 63-59 defeat over previously unbeaten Booker T. Washington Tuesday night in the Lions' gym.

McKenzie's go-ahead shot was followed up by an Aaron James tip in and a free throw by Stanley Deterville for the Green Hornets' margin of victory, snapping Washington's 21-game win streak.

The victory earned Cohen the right to meet Washington in a playoff for the District Three LIALO title.

Cohen trailed Booker T. by 10 points with three minutes left in the final quarter until Ike Conners, Joseph Washington, Deterville, James and McKenzie got rolling.

The Lions held a four point lead at intermission. At the end of the third quarter, Booker T. stretched its lead to 11 points, 48-39.

James and Conners popped in 17 points each and Deterville chipped in with 11 points to round out double scoring for the winners.

Bruce Seals was high man for the losers with 22 points.

Carver downed Clark, 61-48, behind the 22-point output of Robert Hulbert at Clark gym.

The Rams jumped out front in the opening quarter, 20-5, and extended their lead to 18 points at intermission, 34-16.

Coach Thomas Prestitley has guided the Rams to three straight victories after taking over for ill coach Jesse Blakeley and has gotten Carver back into contention for the district crown.

### Forty-Four Schools Admitted

In addition to the 34 former LIALO schools which were accepted for membership, there were 10 other schools accepted by the executive committee at its week-end meeting at the Bellemont Hotel.

Besides the five New Orleans LIALO schools, other schools of this association which were accepted were McKinley of Baton Rouge; Eula D. Britton of Pineville; Esther Toombs of Delhi; Phoenix, Carlisle; Peabody, Alexandria, Scottville, Belle Chasse; Lincoln, Ruston; Concord, Vidalia; Carroll, Monroe.

Also, Alto, Alto; Slocum, Pineville; Parkway, Bossier City; Sabine, Many; Paul Breaux, Lafayette; Westside, Lillie; Eastside, Farmerville; George Washington Carver, De Ridder; Lanier, Shreveport; Ross, Crowley; Booker T. Washington and Bethune, Shreveport; Washington, Lake Charles; Boston, Lake Charles; Plaisance, Opelousas; Holy Rosary Institute, Lafayette; and McDonogh 35, New Orleans.

Admitted but not assigned districts because they had no representatives present were St. Scholastica, all-girls school of Covington; Second Ward of Edgard; Silliman of Clinton, and Valley Forge of Amite. Also admitted were Salmen of Slidell and Project 63 of Shreveport.

and Episcopal High, which must supply its enrollment figures before actually being accepted and beginning competition in District 8-A.

Belle Chasse, a former LHSAA member school, was re-accepted as a member and will compete in 7-A, according to Commissioner T. H. "Muddy" Waters. McKinley, one of the strongest teams in the LIALO, is expected to be included in District 3-AAA as will Tara. Baton Rouge area teams comprise 3-AAA.

Those schools which plan to participate in the spring sports program, must submit birth certificates for varsity athletes prior to the beginning of the spring sports events, advises Waters.

With Belle Chasse and McDonogh 35 placed in 7-A, they will be competing with Newman, E. D. White of Thibodaux, St. Martin's, Mandeville, St. John Prep, Buras and Mid-City.

Additional applications for membership in the LHSAA will be accepted until March 15, according to Waters. After that date, the reclassification committee will work up a plan for all member schools.

There may be some discussion of creating a new classification, Class AAAA, such as in Texas, or to continue with the same five classes but increase the enrollment standards if necessary.

Commissioner Waters, in a long distance conversation with the writer Monday night, disclosed that a proposal by the Rotary Club to promote and sponsor an all-Star football game between Louisiana and Texas prep stars was met with disfavor by the executive committee.

The LHSAA will hold its annual two-day meeting on Friday and Saturday, May 15 and 16 in Baton Rouge with headquarters at the Bellemont Hotel, added Waters.

Final LIALO Basketball Playoffs Will Begin Tonight

As a tribute to the Louisiana Interscholastic Athletic and Literary Organization—the two districts in the New Orleans area are preparing to bow out of an association which covers more than two decades — the zone one and two playoffs will be held here Friday night.

Booker T. Washington's highlyflying Lions easily won their District 3 championship and posted a season record of 23-1 under the direction of head coach Theodore "Abbie" Washington. The Lions' lone setback was handed them by their arch-conference foe Walter L. Cohen.

As their opponent the Lions will have Washington of Lake Charles in the first round play-off of zone one. Washington will represent LIALO District One. Tip-off is 7:30 p.m.

While the Lions and Washington are in combat in the Booker T. Washington gymnasium, across town in Gentilly coach Jesse Blakely's Rams will have as their opponent Scotlandville of District Two. Tip-off is 7:30 p.m., in the Carver gymnasium. Carver won the LIALO District Five championship.


