# Paul Laurence Dunbar Biography

Paul Laurence Dunbar was the first African American to gain national eminence as a poet. Born in 1872 in Cayton, Ohio, he was the zon of ex-slaves and classmate to Orville Wright of aviation fame.

Although he lived to be only 33 years old, Doubar was prolific, writing short stories, novels, librettos, plays, sugs and essays as well as the poetry for which he became well known. He was popular with black and white readers of his day, and his werks are celebrated today by scholars and school children alike.

His style encompasses two distinct voices – he standard English of the classical poet and the evocative dialect of the turn-of-the-century black community in America. He was gifted in poetry – the way that Mark Twain was to prose – in using dialect to convey character.

In 1956, he became principal of Simmesport Colored High School. During this first year as principal, the name of the school was changed to Dunbar High School. He served as principal of Dunbar until 1970 when the school was converted to Simmesport Elemen ary School with grades K-5. He remained as principal at this school until his retirement on September 4, 1984, after serving over 35 years in the teaching profession.

Mr. Brown has membership in numerous educational, religious, social and civic organizations. He is an Alderman and Mayer Pro Tem for the town of Simmesport and Fresident of the Avoyelles Employee Federal Credit Union.
