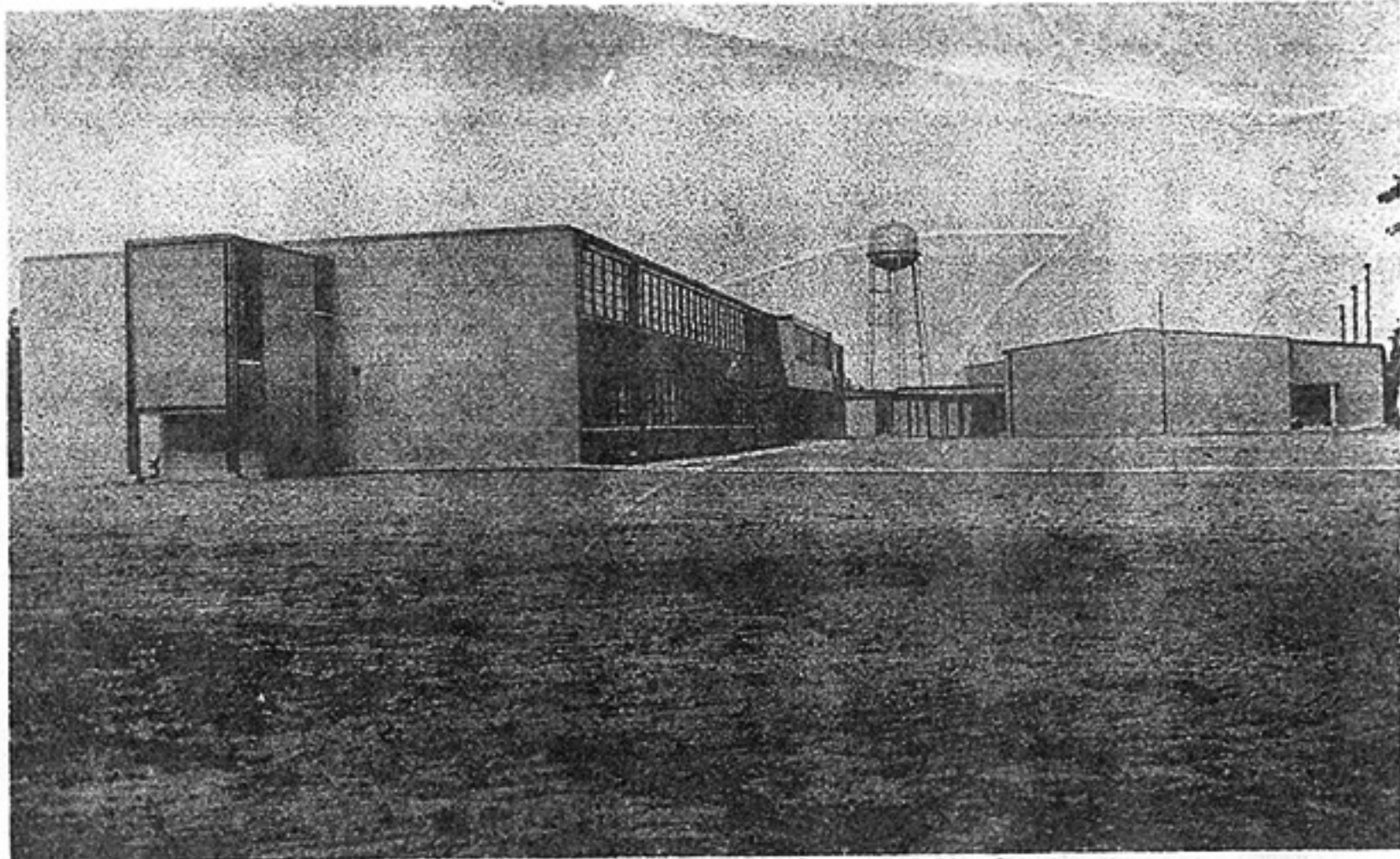

Mr. Jesse C. Crump

Portrait of Jesse C. Crump from Central Memorial High Yearbook

From an early age, Jesse Cornelius Crump's mother instilled the value of education into him. She insisted that each of her sons get a high school education even though the local black school only went up to the 7th grade. Eventually it was decided that Crump would go to live with his father and step-mother in Memphis, Tennessee to continue his schooling. He later entered Southern University while still a high school student and earned his bachelor's degree in 1932. Two years later, he married Wilhelmina Wilson and together they had one daughter. Crump later earned his Master's in education from Atlanta University in 1951 and he did further study at the University of California at Berkley. This dedication to education became the foundation for Crump's long career as an educator in Bogalusa, Louisiana.

Crump served first as a teacher, counselor, then later as the principal of the all-black Central Memorial High School which fulfilled a dream his mother had for him. He was also highly influential in the community and served in many organizations including the Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, the Southern University Alumni Federation, the NACCP, the American Legion, the Louisiana Education Association, and various Masonic organizations.

He was well known for his experience, diplomacy, and courage—all of which served him well when Bogalusa schools finally desegregated in the late 1960s. Central Memorial was closed and the students were moved to the previously all-white Bogalusa High School. The staffs of the two schools were also integrated; Crump was made assistant principal—a role that he kept until 1975. He faced challenges from both blacks and whites during a very tense time in the community's history. He received an outpouring of support from the community upon his retirement. His papers included many letters from colleagues, friends, family, and former students that spoke of his dedication to mentoring and developing young people. Jesse C. Crump passed away April 30, 1983.

ALBERT LAURN JORDAN
(March 16, 1910 - December 27, 1971)

The life of A. L. Jordan, Principal of Central Memorial High School parallels the growth and development of Negro education in Bogalusa. Jordan was born to George Washington and Emma Pough Jordan on March 16, 1910 in Bogalusa, Louisiana. He attended elementary school in Bogalusa and his high school training was done at Alcorn College and his college and graduate training at Morehouse College and Atlanta University respectively. He was an honor student throughout his school career.

Principal Jordan began teaching at Central in 1932 in Industrial Arts. After four years of teaching, he became principal, at which time the school has an enrollment of approximately 600 students and 12 teachers. Of those 600 students only 51 were in the high school and six were graduated during that year.

Jordan was very active in civic, church and fraternal organizations. He was a leader of every civic movement for Blacks in the City of Bogalusa, having been chairman of the Red Cross Drive five times and the Community Chest Twice. During Red Cross, YMCA and Boy's Scouts and Camp Fire Girls. In church work, he was Sunday School Superintendent for 14 years and director of activities in the Sunday School of Second Baptist Church.

In educational activities, Principal Jordan was one of the organizers of the State High School Organization, L.I.A.L.A., past president of the State High School for the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. He held several positions in the Louisiana Education Association and served five terms as District President of L.I.A.L.A. At the time of his death, he was a supervisor with the Bogalusa City School Board.

The educator was married to the former Mary Wilson and they were the parents of one daughter (Constance) and four sons (Alvin, Don, Duane and Lawrence).

Jordan was also affiliated with: American Association of Secondary School Principals, Louisiana Principal Association, Prince Hall Masons, Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity inc., and several other organizations.



CHESTER EMERSON DWELLINGHAM
(1903 -1973)

Chester Emerson Dwellingham was a native of Colfax, Louisiana and a graduate of New Orleans University.

He came to Bogalusa in 1930. He was science and mathematics teacher at both Central High School and Central Memorial High School. He later Became Assistant Principal at Central Memorial High School.

At the time of his retirement in 1970, he was principal of North Avenue Elementary School. Mr. Dwellingham was a member of the Bethlehem Baptist Church, a Member of the Deacon Board and teacher of the Adult Men's Sunday School Class.

He was married to Gladys B. Mims Dwellingham, class of 1932. They had one son, Herschel E. Dwellingham, class of 1963, Three grandchildren and one great-grandchild.



LUCIOUS JEFFERSON

Locious Jefferson, a native of Bogalusa, was born July 25, 1925. He graduated from Central Memorial High School in 1946 and received his B. S. in 1958 from Southern University. In addition, Jefferson received his Education Specialist Degree from the University of Colorado in 1972.

Mr. Jefferson has contributed much to education. He was teacher-coach in Bastrop, Louisiana from 1949-1950. Also an 8th grade teacher and coach at Central High School from 1951-1953, and became Principal of Central Memorial Elementary School in 1954 and continued through 1971, at which time he became Assistant Superintendent of Education in Marion County, Tuskegee, Alabama until 1977.

In 1977, Mr. Jefferson became Director of Directed Teaching at Alcorn State University in Lorman, Mississippi. He is presently Principal at West Marion Elementary School.

The educator is married to the former Daisy Peters of Bogalusa, Louisiana.

THE HISTORY OF CENTRAL MEMORIAL HIGH SCHOOL

Resting in an era surrounded by Avenues "u" and "T". the first Central School was found. Some believed that it was constructed originally as a hospital and some remember it always as a school. Nevertheless, the wooden structure contained four large rooms 48x50' and accommodated grades one through seven.

The first known principal was Professor W. H. Young; the first teachers were Mesdames Alice Smith and Lang. The principal also taught classes. After a few years, Mr. Cush, who became the first photographer, and Mrs. W. H. Young were added to the faculty. Also, under the direction of Professor Young the first band was organized.

Second in command of Central was Professor Z. D. Le Noir. Under his guidance were Mrs. Ethel Smith, Mrs. Le Noir, Mrs. Dunn-Johnson, Misses Robert and Antoinette Bell, Mrs. Johnson, Misses Emma Smith, Mary and Fanny Broome, Pearl Verna B. Jackson, Susie Smith and Mesdames A. L. Hover, Mary Travillion and Cora Washington.

Vocal music entered the school with the coming of the third principal, B. P. Smith. Professor Smith, a former member of the original Fisk Jubilee Singers, led the first musical group.

The Central School now housing grades one through eleven, greeted its fourth principal, Professor Gaddis Hall. Added to the faculty were A. L. Jordan, who replaced O. N. Johnson as shop instructor, C. E. Dwellingham, and Mrs. Martha Travillion.

Athletics made its advent shortly after 1928. The line of coaches for the athletic events were Dr. Cooper, M. C. James, Pat Malone, Charlie Dillworth, Gully Carter, A. L. Jordan, J. C. Crump, Walter Redford, and Clifton Nelson.

With the efforts of Miss Thelma Dorest, A. L. Jordan and N. C. Crump, the name "SPARTAN" was given as the school mascot. The first football team consisted of Willie L. Manning, Reggie Simmons, Adell Stevenson, V. L. Collier, Willie brown, Otha Halbert, William Bailey, Earnest Holloway, Rushell Franklin, Hansel Travillion, John Perkins, Lester Butler, James Smith, Levell Stewart and Hosea Sayles. In 1938 and 1939, the Spartans won their first state championship under John Walter Redford. In 1945 and 1946, Central won two more State Championships under Coach Clifton Nelson.

The first track team was organized in 1935 with J. C. Crump as coach. The team consisted of A. V. Jones, Pearlle Pernell, J. C. Strickland, Freddie Sawyer, Willie Burns, Clifton Nelson and John Anders.

Basketball appeared in 1935 under A. L. Jordan. The first team included Henry Spann, Lattimore Holmes, Freddie Sawyer, Leroy Hawthorn, Clifton Melson, Leonard Thomas, Charles Ray Dillon and A. V. Jones.

The first baseball team included Willie L. Manning, Otha Halbert, Rushell Franklin, L. D. Owens, Ernest Martin, Lovell Stewart and V. L. Collier.

After the return and brief administration of Professor B. P. Smith, A. L. Jordan "took the reins" as leader for the most progressive Central School many of the above named teachers were on the staff and others were added. These included Mesdames V. L. Nash, L. Tyronne, Grace Parry, Mrs. Franklin, Mrs. Speights, Miss Alvin T. Robertson and John Foster.

Under the leadership of Mrs. B. B. Manning and J. C. Crump, the first Spartan newspaper came to light. The copy was a two page-typed edition, containing news of the school.

Due to some unknown causes, the wooden classroom building was burned and classes were held in the various churches.

In 1945, the second era began under the leadership of principal A. L. Jordan. The Central Memorial High School was born. The "Memorial" was added to pay tribute to the veterans who had given their lives in World War II. There were 22 classrooms in this building housed on 3 1/2 acres of land. It was built under the supervision of the Bogalusa School Board. The superintendent was M. J. Israel, and board members were B. D. Talley, Jr., Corbett Mitchell, Andrew Seals and T. J. McDaniel.

Added to the faculty of the new school were Mrs. Ruby Ray as home economics instructor, Miss Jean Tanner, Miss Addison and Miss Rosalind Johnson.

The post war era of the fifties made it necessary to put on a platoon or double-day shift. Added to the faculty were Mrs. I. Y. Hollins, Robert Hodge, Band Director, Mrs. Vera Moody, Misses Dorothy Burns, Ada L. Hannibal, Winona Williams, and Coach Albany Jones. Also, Misses Doris Conerly, Callie Hewitt, Maude Carter and Nellie Fobbs, Lucious Jefferson, Ray Adams, Leon Burns, and J. D. O'Neal, Mrs. Mary Chatmon and Mrs. Orastein Monk came around the same period.

Drama, which was previously done by Miss Taggard and Mrs. Mary Travillion was organized again by Miss A. L. Hannibal.

In 1954, the new Central Memorial High School was built at 1403 North Avenue. This two building plant consisted of twenty-two classrooms, a library a cafeteria, a set of offices and a gymnasium. The curriculum was improved making necessary the addition of new instructors who included Mrs. B. Augustus, Miss Velma Galatas, Crosby Copeland and Miss Juanita Welch.

In 1956, the sixth principal was named, J. C. Crump, to his staff he added Normel Keller, Larry Powe, Johnny Bland, L. X. Speight, Mesdames Georgis Martin, G. W. Gibson, Margie Green, Charlotte Moye, Maxine Small. Also, Gary Magee, Lloyd Charles, Mrs. Floria Graves, Mrs. E. M. Develier, Eugene Butler, Rudolph Davis, Thaddeus Newman, Misses V. I. Mims, Jo Ann Bumfield, Mrs. G. P. Moses and Miss M. J. Berry. Also in this period the new auditorium was built to seat 621 persons; this made the third building on the campus.

There are other events which have no particular place in such a history. One is the "Miss Central" contest which was held each year around Homecoming. In an effort to list the queens of the school, the following names appear: Mary Johnson, Juanita Travillion, Irma Pierce, Alverta Newman, Josie Cotton, Gayle Expose, Bennie R. Robinson, Orastein Ward, Alton Kenny, Evelyn Harris, Juanita Hall, Louis Myles, Ruth Thelma Brown, Elizabeth Brown, Shermon L. Elzy, Audrey Buckley, Josie Jones, Mary Keys, Janice Baham, Laura Patterson, Alvia Bickham, Barbara Hicks, Sherril Young, Willie B. Expose and Barbara Johnson.

The second event that has been in existence almost as long as the school in the "Big Broadcast." This variety show was begun by Mrs. Ethel Smith in 1934. "The Big Broadcast" was named after a movie of that time.

Music for this affair was furnished by the original Rhythm Aces. The show was first held on the porch of Central School. Mrs. Ethel Smith Organized this program in order to raise funds for the school.

Some thirty years later, "The Big Broadcast" is still one of the leading activities of the school.

In its relatively short history, Central Memorial boasts of being one of the first school accredited by the Souther Association of Secondary Schools and Colleges. Other scholastic accomplishments worthy of note are : graduates accepted into any school in the country and graduates returning to be employed in the system from which they were graduates.

As for as extra curricular activities are concerned, its athletic department has consistently been hailed by the colleges and universities. Students received offers to do further study in the area of athletic training.

Its drama department has not only excelled, but has had numerous students who have entered the field of speech and drama.

Central musicians, both instrumental and vocal, have brought credit to themselves and the school.

All in all, there was not an activity on campus that has not helped Central to become even greater than it was.

There was always room for advancement, this the "Central Family" knew. Each year brought about change and the only way to cope with this change was to strive to make one's efforts better.

No one could tell what the fourth era of Central would be like, but one can safely say that if the past was any criterion for the future, then with the solid background laid by those touched Central, there certainly was no need to fear. When the next phase of Central's history is written, there will be no gaps in the story, for these persons now concerned with the school are working assiduously to surpass, if possible, any endeavors set forth by their predecessors.

Blinding speed and a rapier-like stiff arm make Addison Hawthorne one of the West Coast's most promising young football players this season. A junior at the University of Southern California, Hawthorne established a firm reputation as a star at Pasadena City College where he was twice named to the All Western State Conference team.

ADDISON HAWTHORNE

West Coast football star cracks quarter-century color bar at University of Southern California

FOR THE first time in more than a quarter century the University of Southern California has a Negro football star on its varsity. He is Addison Hawthorne, a 21-year-old half-back from Pasadena City College whose sensational record in junior college play has stamped him as one of the top collegiate prospects on the entire West Coast.

Last Negro to play on the USC varsity was Brice Taylor, an All-American running guard who starred in the mid-20's for the Trojans despite the handicap of an amputated hand. Since then the Los Angeles school has enrolled several good Negro football players but none of them ever got further than the junior varsity which plays a separate schedule.

Hawthorne clinched a varsity berth on the Trojan squad during Spring drills when he displayed the polish and skill of a veteran during intersquad games. Running from the tailback spot in USC's single wing formation, Hawthorne consistently broke loose for long runs

and his bull dog tenacity often kept him plunging forward with two or three tacklers on his back. His fiery play even in practice has won him the solid backing of most Blue and Gold fans who watched the Spring drills.

A triple threat back with the drive of a bulldozer, Hawthorne could set new records for ballcarriers at USC simply by keeping pace with his play at Pasadena City College. In two years as a competitor for the school, he stacked up as an offensive giant against Western State Conference opponents. He scored a total of 21 touchdowns and averaged more than 5.1 yards per try in rushes from scrimmage during the period. In 1950, he topped all scorers in the Western State Conference with 12 touchdowns. His offensive excellency earned for him a place on the loop's mythical all-star eleven for each of his two seasons in junior college ball. He should be every bit as good this year.

Head coach Jess Hill, faced with the tough task of building USC back into a West Coast football power, is happy about Hawthorne's progress. "Addison will make a fine regular for us," says Coach Hill.

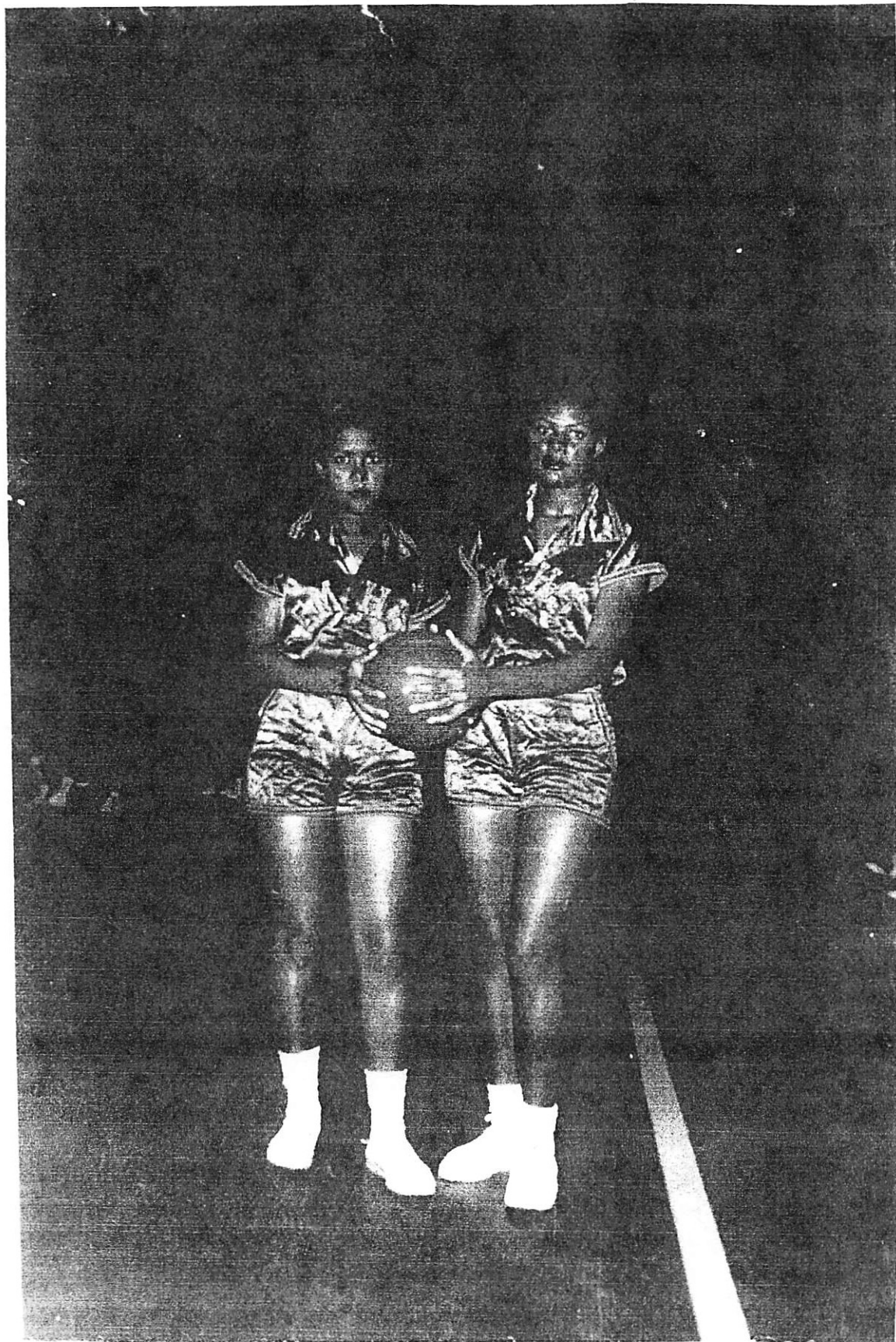

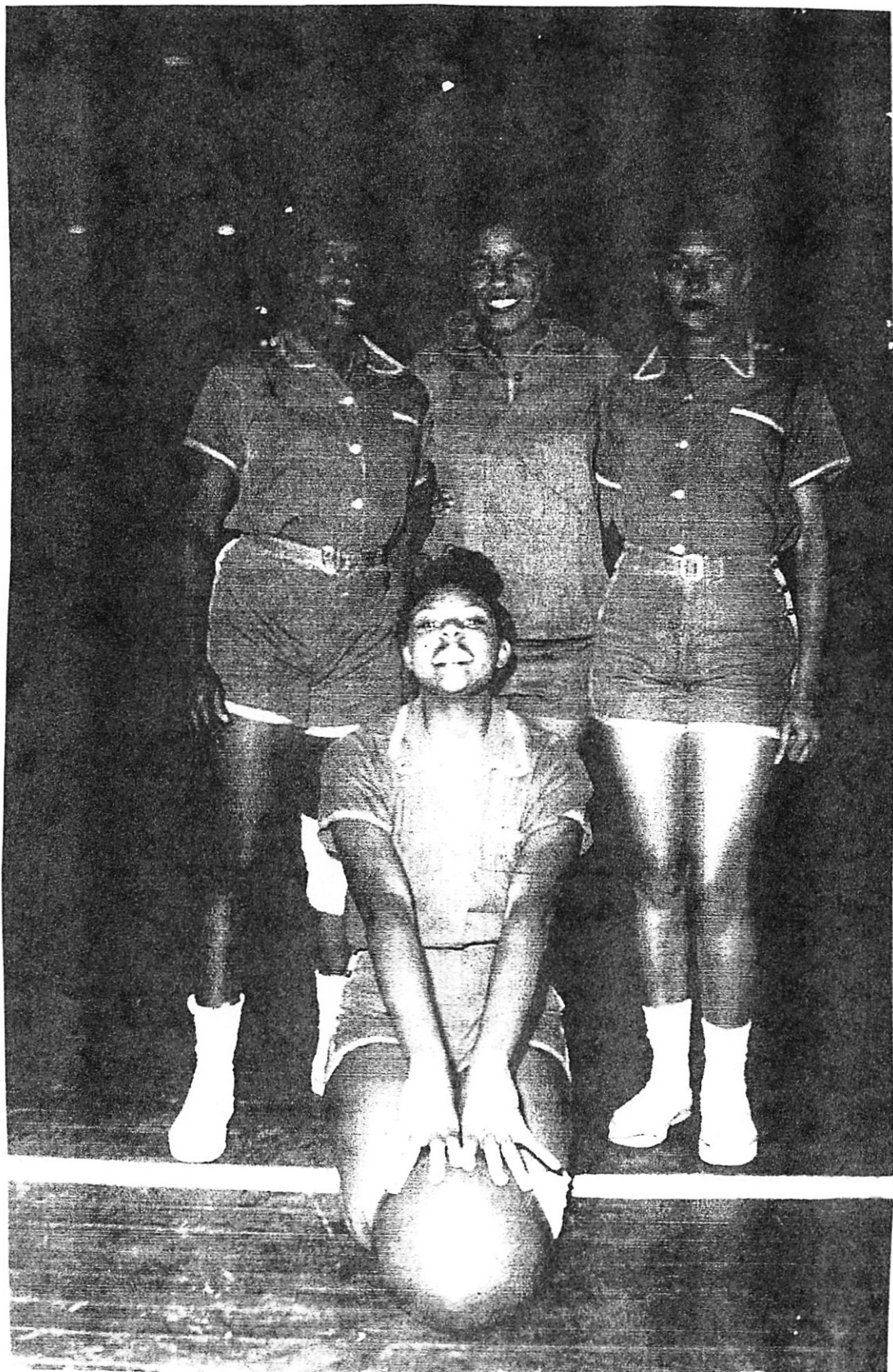
