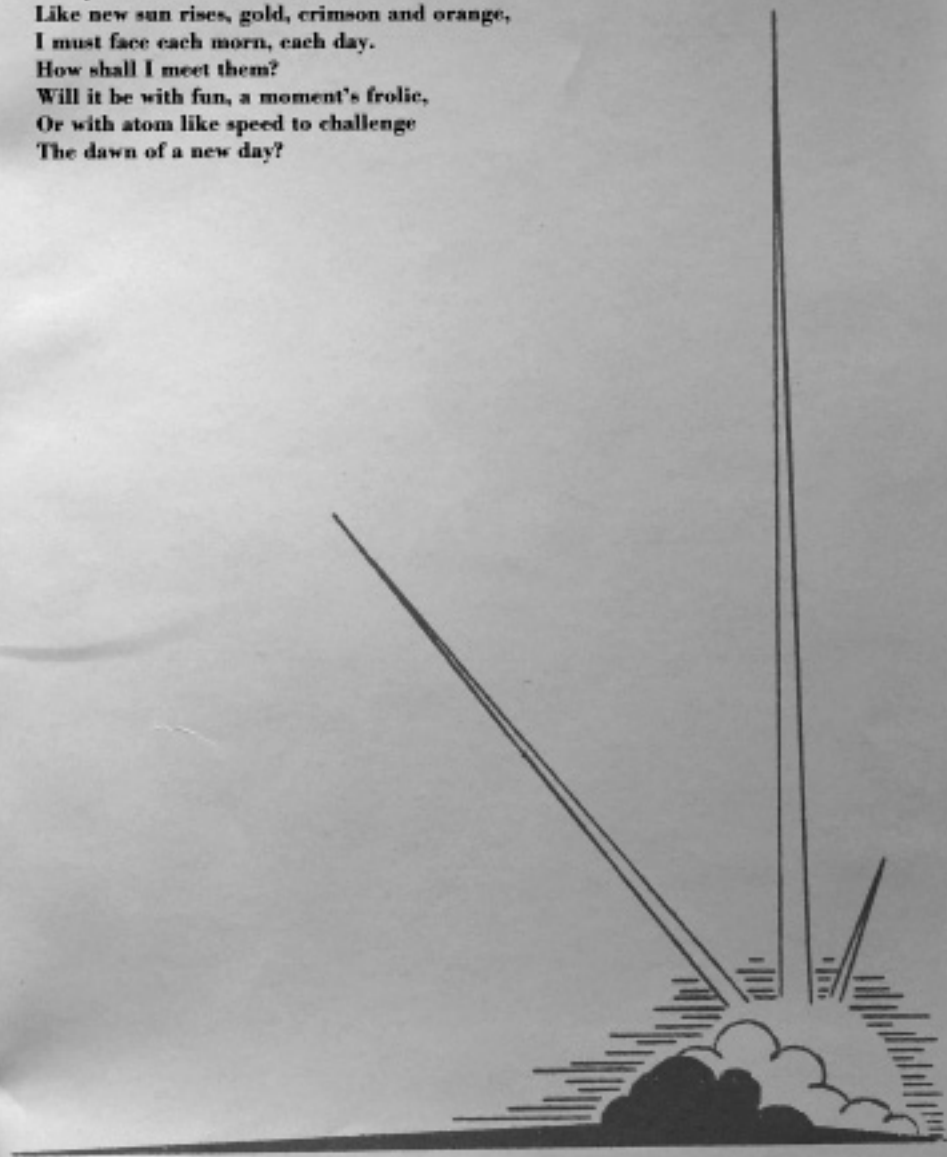

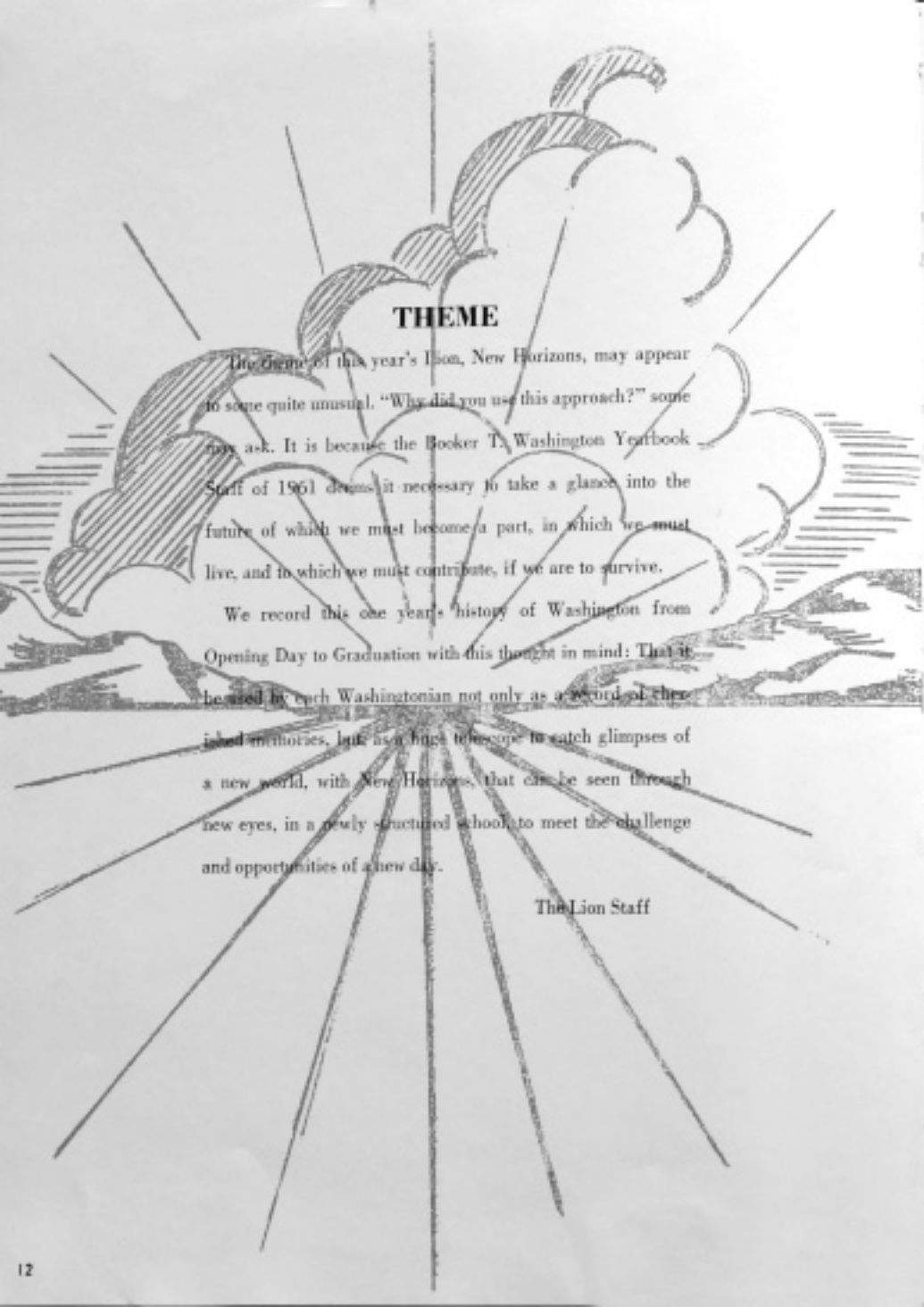
DEDICATION

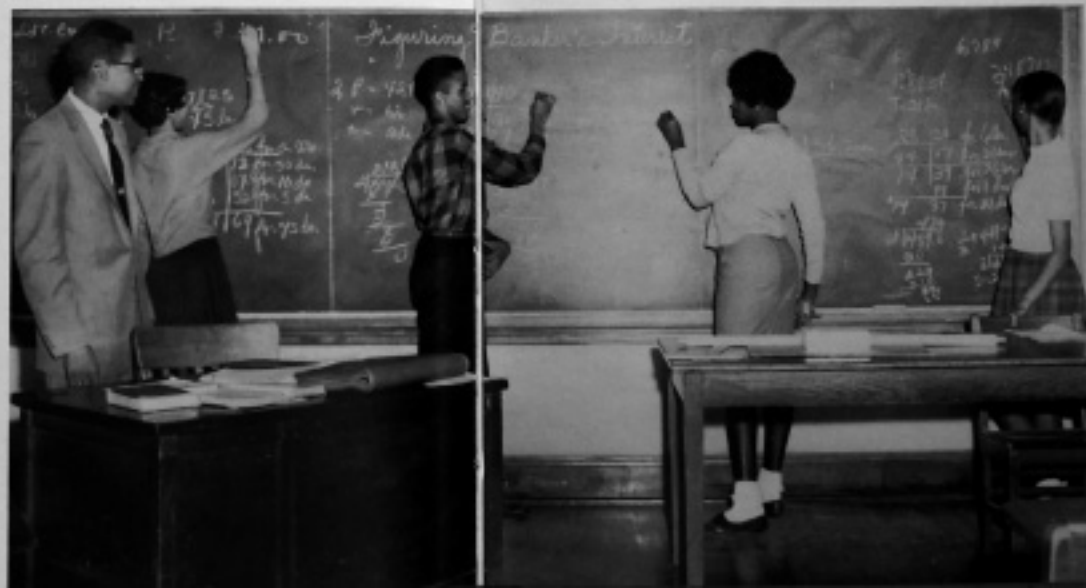

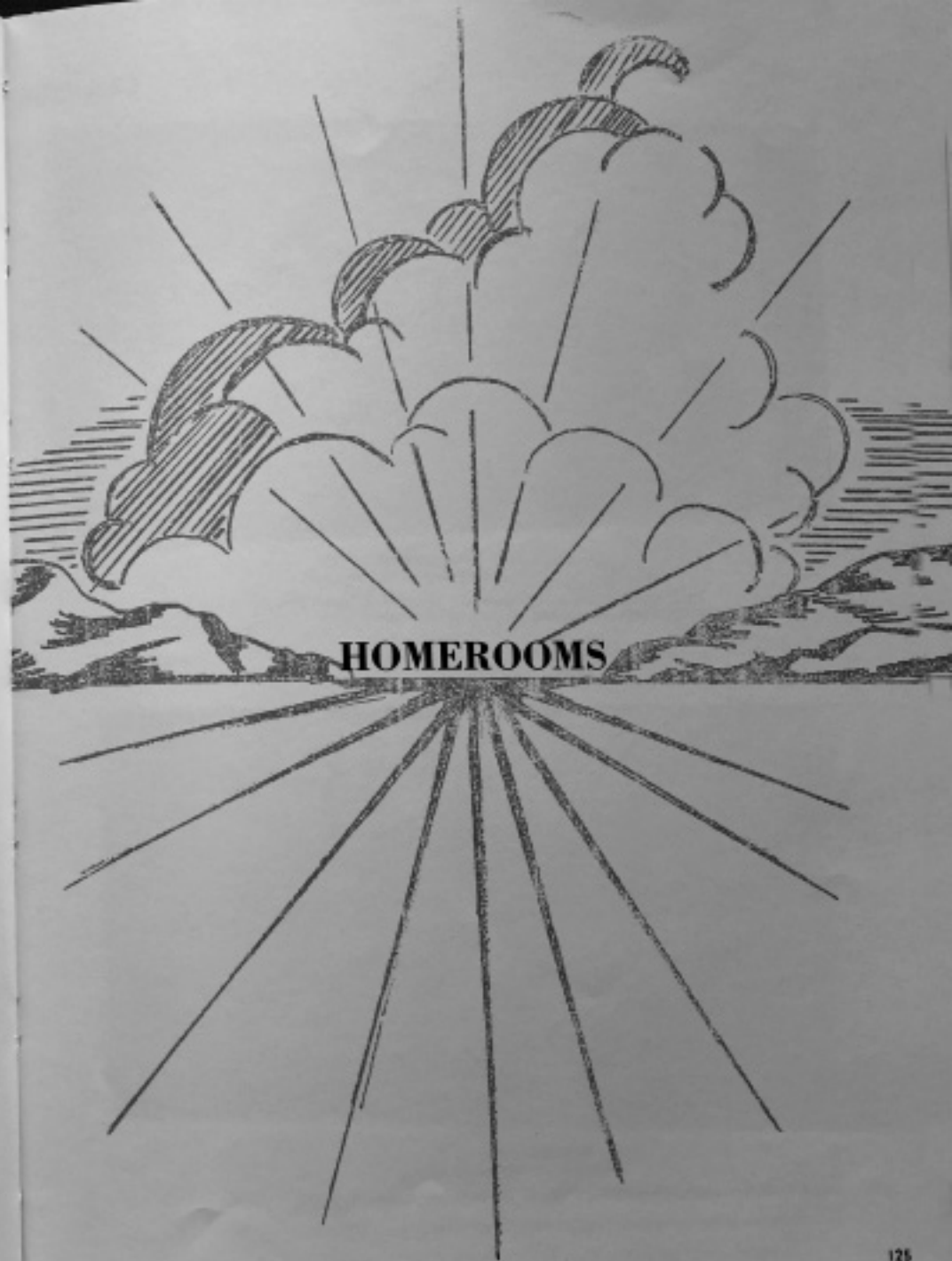


Mr. Angel gives instruction on the use of Audio-Visual Aids.

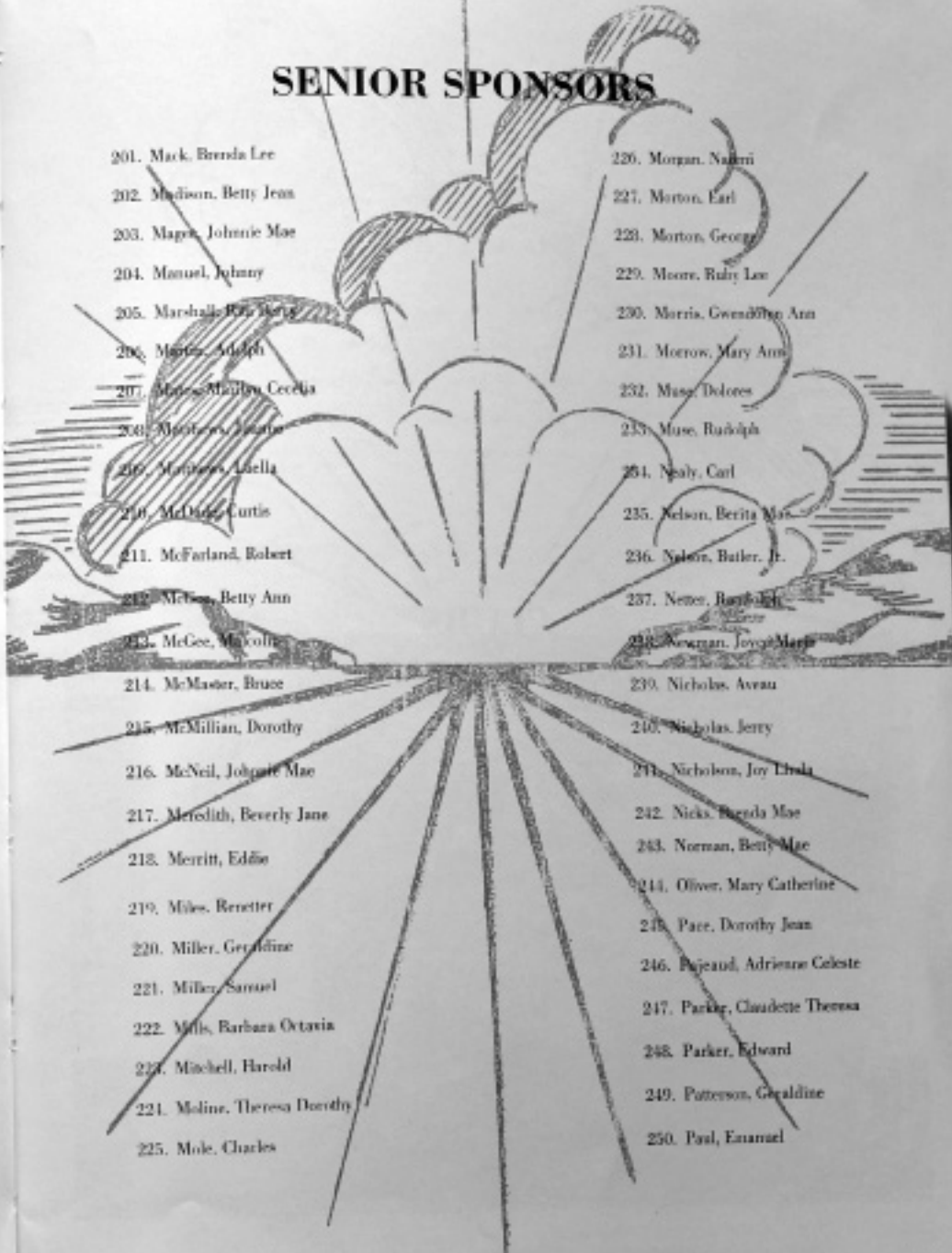

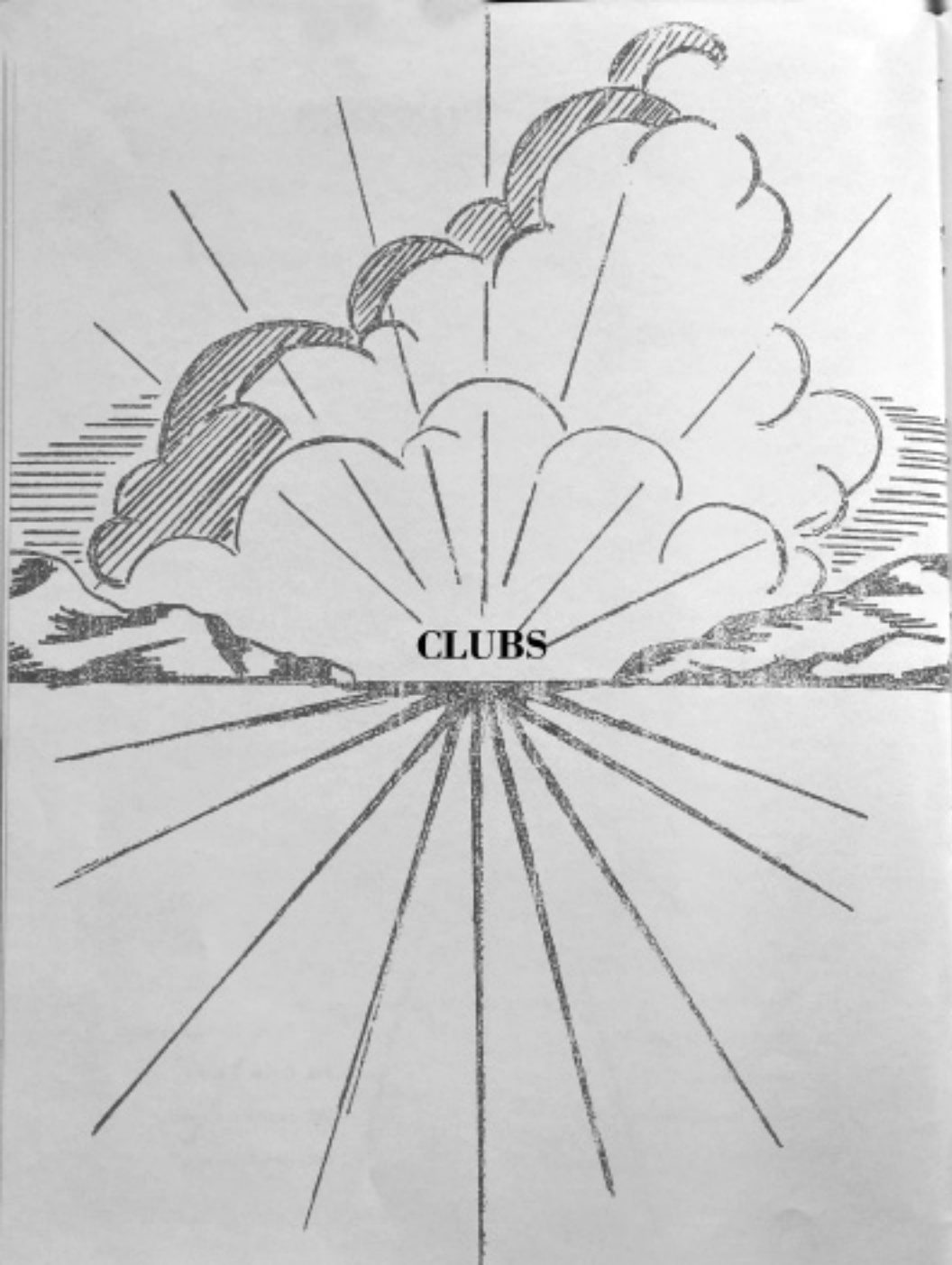

Graduating Class — 1960

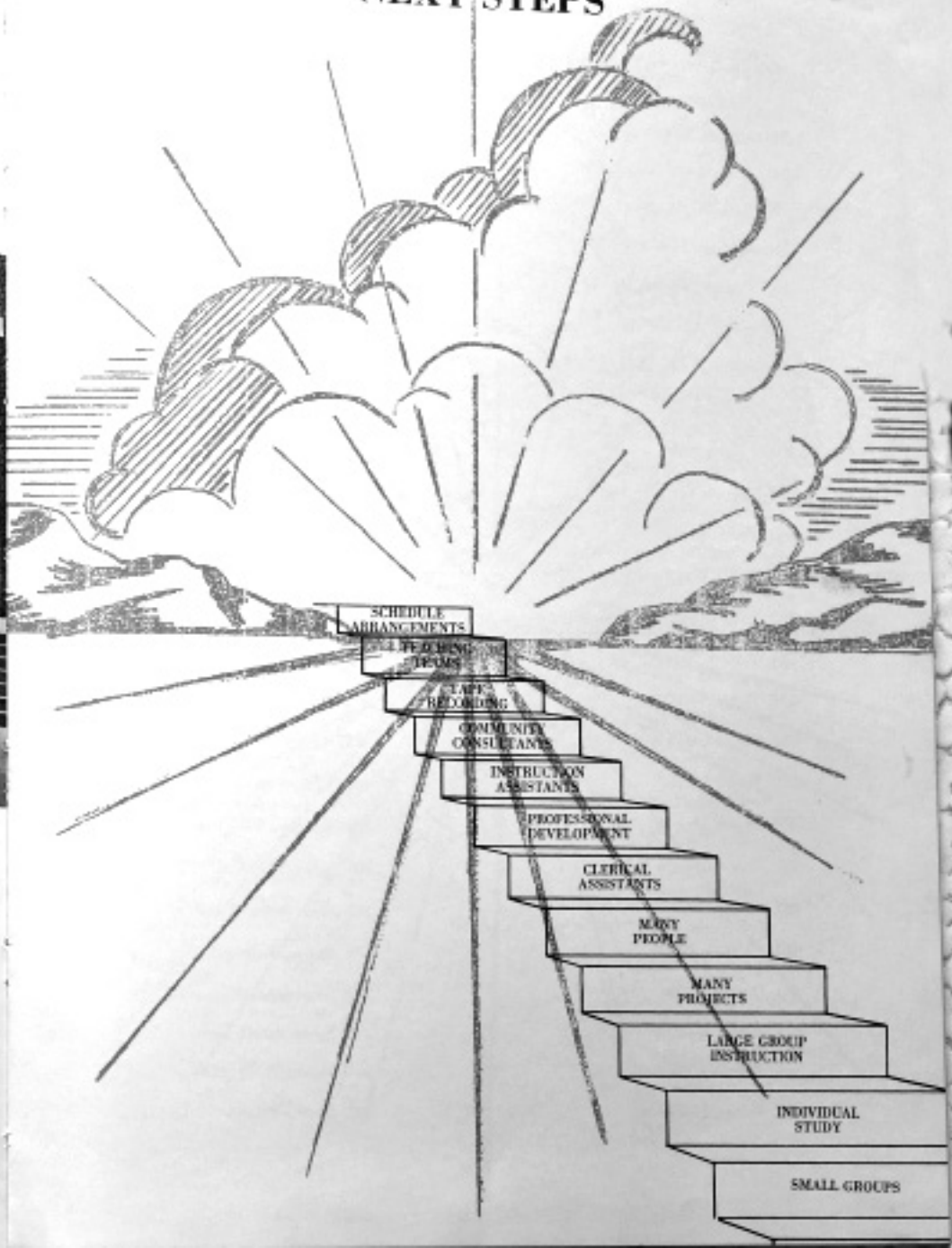
