

P. L. Dunbar Cagers Undefeated in 21

WASHINGTON — The Paul L. Dunbar High school cagers are one of the few undefeated teams in the area and give no sign that they are going to drop a contest in regular season play anytime this year.

This week coach Bill Daniel's lads annexed their 20th and 21st victories in impressive style as they walloped Lincoln of Morrow, 85-35, and then out-spiced Stephens of Ville Platte, 75-56.

In tournament play Dunbar has won the CCOA, Southern University Alumni and the St. Landry Parish tournaments. Their marksmen are averaging 61-3 points per game while allowing an average of 44.9 points to the opposition.

The first five is made up of Clarence Fontenot, John Allen, Jimmie Red, Alvin August and Henry Fontenot. Allen and Clarence Fontenot, the two leading scorers, are story-book athletes that have given Dunbar a one-two punch. August has caught the imagination of the fans with his split-second timing, ball handling wizardry and clutch shooting. Jimmie is a speed merchant whose fine dribbling and chain lightning reaction make him a scoring threat while Henry Fontenot is the bulwark of the defense with his guarding and ball stealing ability.
