Principal of Dunbar Gets 'Barrow Ride

WASHINGTON - The Principal of Paul L. Dunbar had the pleasure of a ride in a wheel barrow Monday at noon while the student body watched and cheered. The occasion was the result of the annual football contest between the two rival schools. Mr. Willie Daniels, former coach of the Dunbar Eagles, had to push Principal N. M. Aldridge around Dunbar High because the Plaisance Indians had failed in their attempt to stomp the Eagles.

In the closest contest ever between the two teams, Dunbar came out on top of a narrow score of 20-18. The first half of the game saw the Eagles run away with a long pass from Quarterback Arthur Murray to Jackie Robinson that took the pigskin to the two yard line where it was snaked over by Quarterback Gerald Williams for the first score.

Gerald Williams converted to make the score 7-0. The second score by the Eagles came when the Indians had stopped a drive just short of the Indians Goal line. The field goal unit came in and faked a field goal and passed to Jackie Robinson from Gerald Williams who went into the end zone unmolested. The Eagles scoring ended with half-back Howard Ware breaking into the scoring column with a long run after receiving a pass from Williams to account for a fifty-nine yard touchdown. This was the eighth touchdown by Ware this season.

If the first half was all Dunbar, the second half was all Plaisance. Trailing 20-6 at the half the Indians bounced back. The first score came in the first half just before the whistle with a pass from John Scott to Joubert that set up a score by half-back Harry Edwards.

Dunbar High Upsets Drew High To Win Tourney, Qualify for State

CROWLEY -- Two St. Landry teams finished one-two in the recent double-A zone basketball championship in a repeat meeting after settling the district championship race.

They were Dunbar of Washington and Drew High of Eunice, who raced neck-and-neck through four quarters of play before Dunbar finally managed to squeeze out on top at the final horn, 60-59.

Dunbar leaves today for the state championship tourney at Baton Rouge, to compete among three other zone winners across the state for the biggest crown of all.

The win over Drew High came as a big upset, for Dunbar had

lost to Drew, 103-80, in the district championship game. But behind the clutch and determined play of Dunbar's Clarence Fontenot, with 24 points, Henry Phoenix and Maxie Bowman, Dunbar scored a dramatic come-from-behind victory.

En route to the championship zone finals, Dunbar knocked aside Patterson and DeRidder in succession, each a district champion.

Dunbar has now won 28 games while losing only six. Other big wins for them this season were in the C.C.O.A. and the parish tournaments, the latter crown for the fourth consecutive year.

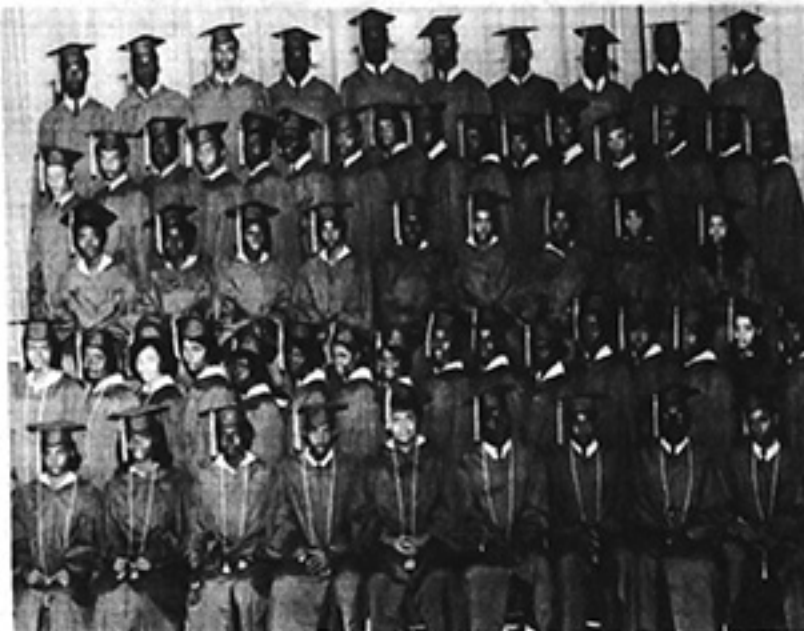

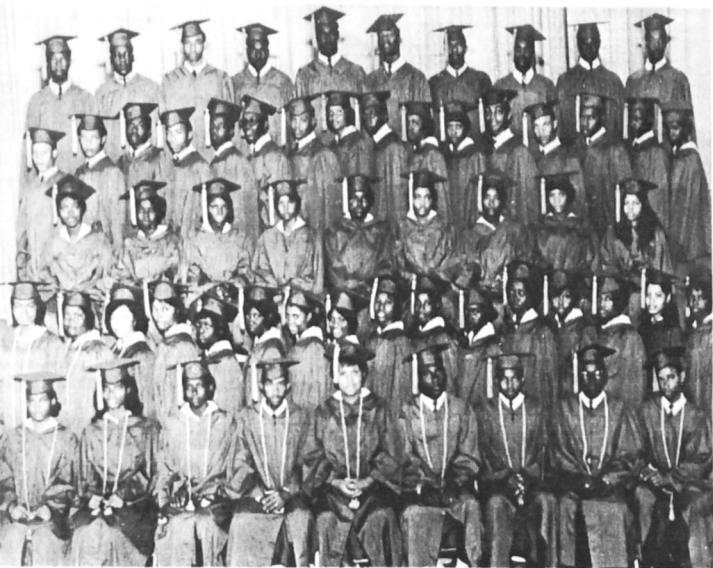
Dunbar Sets Four League Track Marks
