WASHINGTON - The e Principal of Paul L. Dunbar had the pleasure of a ride in a wheel barrow Monday at noon while the student body watched and cheered. Aldridge around Dunbar High because the Plaisance Indians had failed in their attempt to stomp the Eagles.

In the closest contest ever between the two teams, Dunbar came out on top of a narrow score of 20-18. The first half of the game saw the Eagles run away with a long pass from Quarterback. Arthur Murray to Jackie Robinson that took the pigskin to the two yard line where it was snaked over by Quarterback Gerald Williams

for the first score.

Gerald Williams converted to make the score 7-0. The second score by the Eagles came when the Indians had stopped a drive just short of the Indians Goal line. The field goal unit came in and faked a field goal and passed to Jackie, Robinson from Gerald Williams who went into the end zone unmolested. The Eagles scoring ended with half-back Howard Ware breaking into the scoring column with a long run after receiving a pass from Williams to account for a lifty-nine yard touchdown. 

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
Dunbar Sets Four League Track Marks
