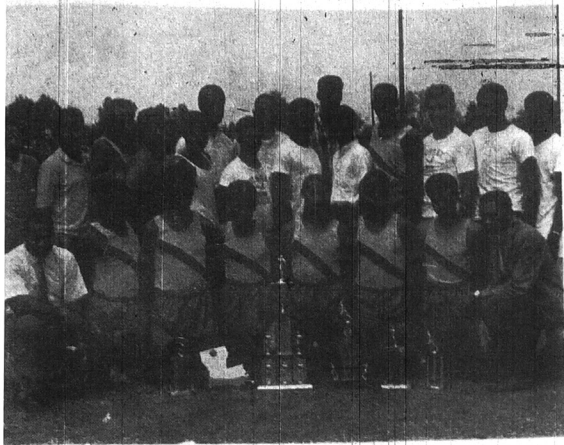

Dunbar Wins State; Sets 3:22.5 Record

Dunbar High School began its first track team in 1955. From that time on different team members have set records in the district, zone, parish, and state. This year Coach Redd and Coach Pitre put together a team that surpasses all others.

For the first time in history of the school Dunbar on the State "AA" Track and Field meet held at Southern University, Saturday, May 3, 1969.

For the first time in the history of the school Dunbar's One Mile Relay team placed first in the State, with a new state record for "AA" of 3:22.5 breaking the old mark of 3:23.8 set in '68 by T. A. Levy. Members of the Mile Relay team are: The Ware boys, Harvey and Howard, Sam Watson, and anchorman, Reynard Rose.

Dunbar on their way to winning State honors had three first places, Sam Watson in the half mile, Charles Fontenot in the javelin and the mile relay.

Dunbar collected 43 points for first place. Cypress Grove 31 second and T. A. Levy 27 points

for third place.

Reynard Rose, a senior track star at Dunbar won the outstanding track award. Rose placed second in the 440 dash (49.9), third in the 220 yard dash at a time of 23.0, and anchored the Mile Relay in a time of 3:22.5 for a new state record for "AA".

Sam Watson a soph. won team honors by collecting 10½ points. Watson won the 880 run in a time of 2:00.1, placed third in the 440 dash 50.0, and ran third leg in the Mile Relay.

In the high jump, Clifton Siverand placed 4th, Charles Fontenot won the javelin with a distance of 167'6" and placed 4th in the triple jump with a leap of 42'11".

state in "AA" in HH suffering from a pulled muscle finished second in the HH. Williams had posted the fastest time in the state for "AA" in the LH slipped off the blocks and had to come from last position to finish 5th.

WASHINGTON -- The Paul L. Dunbar High School Eagles took the first round of the Zone Playoffs Thursday night by defeating Reed High School of Napoleonville by a score of 99-76.

Leading the Eagles offense was Charles Fontenot, Donald Isles and Bobby Pickney, scoring 39, 19 and 17 points respectively. High man in the rebound department was Charles Fontenot with 22. Other rebounders in the double figures were David Thomas, 13 and Sam Watson, 14.

Tied 20-20 at the end of a close first quarter, the Eagles pulled away in the second, scoring 33 points to make the score 53-39 at the half.

In third quarter, the Eagles extended the lead to 77-59. With the game virtually on ice in the fourth and final quarter, the Eagles had a chance in the closing seconds to reach the century mark but were denied by the defense of the losing Reed cagers. The game ended 99-76.

Dunbar High Ended Long Travel to Attend School

WASHINGTON — The desire for an education made travel a vital necessity for the citizens of Washington. The absence of a school in the community before 1912 caused students to travel to Opelousas to attend school.

Some students had relatives who lived in Opelousas. These students moved to live with their relatives during the school year. Others who were not fortunate enough to live with relatives had to walk the six miles to Opelousas or ride horseback to school. This situation made it almost impossible to obtain an education. The many hours spent in traveling to and from Opelousas made the performance of the necessary chores on plantations and farms impossible. The need for a school in Washington became felt.

First School

The first school was built in 1913. It had only one room. Grades 1-5 would be taught in the Washington Colored School. Miss Eva McKay came from Baton Rouge to become the first principal and teacher. She was the only teacher employed, therefore she taught five grades in the one room school, from 1913-1917.

The trying twenties saw principals come and go. Miss McKay, the first principal, went back to Baton Rouge. She was replaced by a Methodist preacher, Rev. J. L. Long, who served as principal for two years. Mr. G. H. McGaffrey, known throughout the parish as the "Professor," replaced Rev. J. L. Long and served for two years until Rev. C. J. Boswell, the present pastor of Little Zion Baptist Church in Opelousas, was principal from 1923-1927. Rev. Boswell was followed by Mrs. Bessie Augustus who served only one year as principal.

The faculty began growing in size in 1928. Mr. I. D. Moreau became principal. Mrs. Josephine Gray (mother of the present assistant principal, Mrs. Goldie Johnson), joined the faculty. With Mrs. Gray came Mrs. Helen Lee and Mrs. I. M. Solette. Mr. Moreau served as principal for 10 years.

Grades Added

More rooms were constructed in 1938 and two grades were added, 1-7. Mr. Frank J. Jackson became principal and served in that capacity until 1966, a period of 28 years. The school finally became an elementary and secondary school in 1942.

The first graduating class finished in 1912. There were three in the first graduating class: Jone Mae Gauthier, Ber-

ably impressed with the workable, spacious, attractive and neatly arranged rooms which create an atmosphere conducive to learning.



Principal Aldridge

P. L. Dunbar High School was evaluated in 1961 by the Louisiana State Department of Education and its administrative faculty and non-instructional staff were commended for "the full utilization of the abilities, capabilities and skills of each group." This highly qualified faculty, using the instructional facilities available in the school and community, can look with pride to the outstanding accomplishments of the students.

Dunbar is highly recognized in LIALO competition (Louisiana Interscholastic Athletic and Literary Organization). Dunbar has a history of dominance in basketball, ranging from the early days when Mr. Frank Jackson was principal-coach, to the great years of Mr. Willie Daniels, now principal of Plaisance High and the present dominance of Mr. Clifton Lermelle.

Athletic Laurels

Under the coaching of Clifton Lermelle and Jimmie Redd, Dunbar High this year placed first in District basketball and first in the state in track and field. Dunbar has a trophy room to show its history in athletics, scholarship, music and speech and drama.

Looking at only a few of the outstanding graduates from rural Washington would astound the average.

Thonius Robinson, graduate of 1964, now a major in the U.S.

families and making various contributions to our society.

Promotion of individual members of the Dunbar staff speaks well of its competence. In 1964, Mr. Willie Daniels was made principal of Plaisance High; next year Mr. N. M. Aldridge was made principal of Northeast Elementary School. Mr. Joel Green was made principal of Happy Hill Elementary School; Mr. Joel Green was made principal of Happy Hill Elementary School in Eunice; Mr. Wade Thompson became principal of Dunbar Elementary school.

Jackson Retires

In 1966, Frank J. Jackson ended 28 years as principal as he retired from the profession. A replacement was sought. Mr. Nahum M. Aldridge had headed the Science Department and had been chairman of The Committee on Professional Studies. He knew the philosophy of the Dunbar School community. Therefore, after serving only one year as principal of Northeast Elementary School in Opelousas, N.M. Aldridge came back to take the reins as principal of the school where he had taught for 13 years. Dunbar now continues to endeavor to develop the minds and hearts of its students to prepare them to better life in a Christian democracy.

8 New Records Set As Clark Takes Meet

The record books took a whole of a beating at the St. Landry Athletic Association Track and Field Championships in Opelousas Wednesday. No less than eight new records were established and two others tied during the course of the event.

J.S. Clark led the assault with five new standards and one old one tied. Members of the Dunbar squad established two records and Woodson athletes set and tied records. Clark captured the team title with 108 points. Dunbar was second with 85. Clark's and Woodson had a tight battle for third with the former garnering 39 points and the latter 34. Holy Ghost had three and Lincoln one.

There were four double winners during the competition and Dunbar was strongest in the relays with two wins. Topping the individual efforts was Clark's Rodney Milburn, co-holder of the national 120-yard high hurdles record of 13.5.

Milburn took the highs with a 13.9 effort which set a new meet record. Two former Clark Clark's, Rodney Warner and Fulton Lewis, shared the old mark of 14.4. He took the 180-yard lows with a 19.4, breaking his own mark of 19.6 set in 1967. He anchored the 440-yard relay team that turned in a record-breaking 44.1 along with Vincent Hall, Reginald Stewart and Warwick Rosette. Two former Clark teams held the old record of 44.8. Milburn also ran on the mile relay team that finished second behind Dunbar in a time of 3:28.1.

Daniel Craven of Woodson won both the triple and long jumps. With the aid of a hop and step, he jumped 44-0 to set a new record and then tied a long jump record of 22-6.

Clark's James Lazard set one record with a javelin throw of 174-0. Teammate Reginald Stewart also dominated the sprints as he broke one record and tied another. His 10.0

century surpassed the old mark of 10.2 and his 22.6 furlong tied Paul Anderson's old record.

The Dunbar 880 and mile relay teams set new standards: Howard Ware, Sam Watson and Reynold Rose ran in both events while Lester Williams rounded out the 880 team and Marshall Alexander the mile squad. Dunbar's Sam Watson took the half in 2:06.1 and teammate Reynold Rose won the 440 in 53.3.

Clarence Pickney of Dunbar took the mile in 4:54.6. Alford Joubert of Plaisance took the pole vault with an 11-0 effort and Clark's Alvin Hebert took the high jump with fewer misses at 5-8. Amos Jones of Clark also went for 5-8. The winner's Willie Smith took the discus with 124-6.
