MID-SEASON 1964:

A look ahead and a look backfinds the Lincoln Trojans of MArrero perched atop District III with a 6-0-0 record after their Friday night 20=7 victory over Carver of New Orleans. The victory was the fruit of some nifty running by Coleman Zeno and Samuel Eugene of the Trojans. Among the six victories of the Lincoln club have been wins over Fifth Ward, Martyn, Second Ward, Cohen. None of these clubs would be classified as a strong foe for the season of 1964. There was also a victory over Landry which has now lost four of its six games. Lincoln's last victory was over C rver of New Orleans, which, as of the moment, is going along at a 1-3-1 clip. In the downtown District V, St. Augustine is booming ahead with a 6-0-0 record. They have tested several of the tougher clubs in the State, including Washington of Lake Charles, McKinley of Baton Rouge, and have been able to emerge victorious.

As the season heads into its final 3 weeks, both Lincoln and St. Augustine are confronted with a steady diet of district competition. After the game with Blount of Mobile, St. Aug will take on, in order, Clark, X avier Prep and Carver. Lincoln has yet to face McDonogh #35, Booker T. Washington, Kavier Prep.

On Sunday night at City Park, it was the Blount Leopards of Mobile vs the Purple Knights. St. Augustine was obviously hobbled by the loss of its backfield speed, due to injuries to flanker Glenn Alexander and halfbacks Mack Simmons and Joe Simms. Relying on the power of sophomore fullback Freddie Johnson, the marched with the opening kickoff inside the Prep twenty before the drive sputtered, with the aid of some timely penalties. KNIGHTS WRAP UP DISTRICT V CROWN IN THE MUD

This had been a week of wondering and pondering, ;as the Purple Knights waited for the show-down battle in their quest for their second consecutive District V football championship. A team which had been almost invincible offensively and defensively against the best opposition in the State, had come to a grinding halt. In their eighth game, they were lucky to eke out a 6-6 tie with fired-up Kavier Prep. What had been the most fearsome backfield quartet in the State ; with speed, size and explosiveness and supreme confidence, was now a complete shambles. Flanker Glenn Alexander and Fullback Freddie Johnson were in the hospital with a shoulder separation and a broken leg, respectively. Halfback Macklin Simmons had not suited up for two weeks due to a bad leg. The Furple Knights were to face the Carver Rams in the showdown. Last year, for the first time in the history of the meetingd of these two teams, the Knights were victorious 33-0. As they entered this game, Carver's 1964nrecord was, to say the least, unimpressive. Their only victory was a 24-6 win over Booker Washington of New Orleans. To complicate the proceedings even more, a half-hour before game-time, the rains began to fall. The cutcome became even more imponderable.

The game was played in a sea of mid. When it was all over, the score was 6-0 in favor of St. Aug's Knights. The offensive moment of truth came with 10:50mon the clock in the second quarter. The Knight moved into the three yard line and Ernie Johnson, who was doing most of the quarterbacking today, slipped in on a sneak, and the scoring

ended with the play on which it began.

This may have been the offensive story of the game, but perhaps, the most thrilling and challenging moments for the fans came midway in the fourth period. With Carver in possession on their own 35, the punter took a bad pass from center and in order to avoid the onrushing Furple horde, he turned and punched a line drive kick which hopped and slithered through the Knight secondary. Finally the Knights gathered it in on about their own 23. They promptly fumbled and the crowd sensed that this was a moment of truth. The Rams reacted to the opportunity as a band injected with pure momentum. They moved the ball quickly with drive and determination to two first downs and the Knights' three, where it was first and goal. District championship literally hung in the balance. Some have said that for any team to be of championship stature, they must have the defense which can meet the challenge inside their cwn tem. The Knights showed their class, and at the end of four downs, the Rams had moved backward from the three to the twelve.

In the absence of their running power, the Knights had to rely on some true, but overshadowed performers. The muddy and rugged chores were done by Emile Labat, Claude Schiat, Alvin Lee, Ron Jarrell and Don Esteen. But the day belonged to the defense. The familiar names of Danny Bakewell and Mac McLaughlin, Ernie Singleton and Anthony Lowery were heard time after time as they got a hand on every Ram who came their way. Coach Eddie Flint was gladdened and commented on the fine performance of young Walther Thomas, who won his spurs and worked in nicely for LarrynWalker who was nursing an ailing hand at the center position. Walker is considered by the coaches as perhaps St. Aug's most indispensable offensive lineman.
