HISTORY OF ATHENS COLORED HIGH SCHOOL, ATHENS NEGRO HIGH SCHOOL, AND HILLCREST HIGH SCHOOL (They are the same school. The name was changed).

The beginning of Athens Colored High School, Athens Negro High School and Hillcrest High School goes back to 1936, when Mr. John Lopo was assigned

to the position as principal of Athens Colored Elementary School. He was a dedicated servant to the entire community. After serving seven years in this capacity, he like others seeking a higher salary, decided to go west. He returned in 1948 with more money, more knowledge, and a dream that Athens could move forward.

Mr. Lopo's first goal was to get the community together as one large family. With his personality, professional, and leadership ability, he organized a strong P. T. A. and began to work toward accomplishing better means of education for the pupils of Athens.

Finally, a bond issue for a high school was passed. The Athens Negro High School was completed in 1953. Students came from St. John, Mayflower, New Friendship, Calhoun, Mt. Olive, some students from Homer Colored (Negro) High School and other elementary schools in the parish were bussed to the new school. Six school buses with one bus making two trips daily brought

the students to school.

The school claims grounds consisting of 21 acres and an enrollment of 619 students. The school had separate baseball and football fields, study hall, library, principal's office, gymnasium, cafeteria, home economic department, and 11 classrooms.

In November, 1953, an open house and "appreciation" barbecue was attended in honor of the official opening of the new Athens Negro High School by over 1,000 people including 400 whites.

Speakers of the evening program were: G. C. Jones, Supervisor of Negro Schools; J. B. Lopo, principal of the new school; H.W. Whatley, principal of Athens school for the whites; F. A. Davis, Reese Van Hooser, Conway Gandy, and E. B. Buckner. Music was provided by the girls' chrous under the direction Mrs. Lois Williams, music instructor.

The first teachers who taught at Athens Negro High school were as follows: Mrs. Morgan Martin, Mrs. Lula Candler Crawford, Mrs. Daisy Darrett, Mrs. Lizzie Banks, Mrs. Mary Slaughter, Mrs. Vivian Lopo, Mrs. N. B. Jones, Mrs. Dorothy White, Mrs. Louise Houston. Mrs. Vera Walker, Mrs. Pearlie Wright, Mr. J. E. Willliams, Mrs. Lois Williams, Mrs. Wilder, Miss Annie Lee White, Mr. Walker Evans, and Mr. N. A. Jones.

Mr. Lopo was principal for one year. On July 1,

1954, he took on the role as Supervisor of Instructions in Claiborne Parish Schools. Mr. J. E. Williams, who was the eight grade teacher, became principal for four years. Upon his death, Mr. Shirtee Evans, Sr., who was teaching eight grade became principal for the rest of the school years leading up to 1970 when the schools began intergrating.
