

# Eagles Eliminated from Playoffs

Winning, the seemingly endless way of doing things for Second Ward, finally ended for the Eagles.

It seemed that No. 1 ranked Sicily Island thinks this year is its turn to win. In continuing that streak they caused the Eagles' dreams to end in Ferriday at the wrong end of a 16-0 score.

Before losing, Coach Rudolph Dinvaux saw his team fight and scrap, but as he put it, "not enough to win."

"We played a good game in holding a high-scoring club like Sicily Island to only 14 points. However, we just didn't play like we should," added Dinvaux.

Offensive breakdowns, such as four fumbles, penalties and overthrown passes, unsettled the Eagles. Of the four fumbles, three came on third down situations and prevented Second Ward from any real threats.

Second Ward finished the season at 7-4 while Sicily Island will bring its 12-0 slate into this week's semi-final clash with Acension Catholic.

Trailing 6-0 late in the second period the Eagles put up their only real threat. They moved 35 yards down to the one-yard line before being held after having a first and goal from the four.

Besides not getting a score there, a big score was recorded by Sicily Island late in third quarter which turned the game

around.

Dinvaux said, "That play was the turning point because we hit their fullback, but didn't stop him from running 35 yards for a touchdown."

Sicily Island fullback Terry Brooks, who managed 127 yards against Second Ward, got 47 of those on this play for a menacing six-pointer. After they added a two-point conversion the Eagles faced a 14-point deficit with a period to play.

The home team got the final points of the night when they trapped Linwood Boudin for a safety in his own end zone trying to run back a punt in the final minute of play.

Two key figures on the Eagle offense didn't figure too prominently in the outcome. Young quarterback Emanuel Barre could hit only two of seven passes for 38 yards.

"Emanuel who had trouble finding his receivers, made some mistakes especially, overthrowing receivers on several occasions and fumbling two snaps," said Dinvaux.

While Barre tried to solve his problems, Grant Pierre, the Eagle rushing leader, was held to 50 yards of ground work after averaging 150 in the last two games. Pierre, although his average was below par did get 1,000 yards for the season.

Sicily Island was the first to score, eating most of the first quarter clock on

Terry Brooks' rushing in the single-wing formation. At the one Prince Dunbar went over for the first TD. The extra point was missed for a Sicily Island 6-0 lead.

Linebacker Keith Alexander and middle

guard Randy Meadeaux gave good efforts on defense for the Eagles. Alexander made nine tackles and four assists while Meadeaux has had seven tackles and two assists.

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## Second Ward Defeats Woodland

Facing one of the toughest teams in Class A, Second Ward's season in phase. Coach Rudolph Dinvaux led his Second Ward Eagles.

Coming off a 37-6 bi-district win over Woodland and a bye last week, Second Ward Island after a rout over Grambling two weeks before this set up this showdown.

The playoff game is slated for 7:30 p.m. in Ferriday, Friday, Nov. 30.

"They're number one,

and we're going to assume they're a good club," said Dinvaux, casually about that showdown.

For that contest the Eagles hope to have their offense cranked up behind quarterback Emanuel Barre. The youngster, who has had to fill Terry Robiskie's shoes, has become a good passer in his own right.

Over the season he has hit 31 of 68 passes for 458 yards and six scores. He has also averaged five yards a carry rushing in the Eagle offense.

Joining him in Second Ward's backfield are halfbacks Grant Pierre and Alvin Turner and fullback Samuel Favorite. Pierre is the leading rusher with 384 yards on 150 carries and a 6.5 yard average.

Turner has a 5.3 yard average on 66 attempts and 365 yards, while converted tackle Favorite has rushed for 156 on 32 carries and just under five yards a crack.

Tight end Keith Alexander is the leading receiver with 18 catches for 294 yards and four

touchdowns. Alexander, who also plays linebacker, is the interception leader with six and two going for touchdowns.

Besides a well-manned offensive machine, Second Ward will need the same type of defensive equipment. Middle guard Randy Meadeaux and Alexander are the team's leading tacklers and are the keys to the defense.

This week the defense will face the old single-wing offense from Sicily Island.

"We will adjust some of our defenses to com-

petate for their double-team blocking off that formation," said Dinvaux.

Last week the Eagles totally dominated the ball game against Woodland by racking up 277 total offense of which 253 came on the ground. The Bulldogs managed 126 yards of real estate with only 51 of those coming on the ground.

Second Ward increased its season record to 7-3 while Woodland finished with a 6-5 slate.

Second Ward started the scoring early in the first period when Grant Pierre went over right tackle following Carl Gauthier's block for six yards at 8:21 coming off a 60-yard drive. Carl Gauthier kicked the PAT.

The Eagles got another score near the end of the period when Alvin Turner blasted past the Bulldog line for a 41-yard TD.

Carl Gauthier added his second PAT.

Grant Pierre got his second score of the night when he swept right end for 36 yards and a touchdown with 1:56 left in the half following a Meadeaux fumble recovery.

Gauthier added his third PAT.

The defense collected the next points for the Eagles when Allen and Carl Gauthier trapped Bulldog punter Jack Houston in the endzone following a fumbled snap at 7:37 of the third quarter.

Midway in the final stanza the Eagles moved from their own 49 down to Woodland's 16. From there, Emanuel Barre rolled left and hit Linwood Boudin for another score.

Not too long after that, Alexander got Second Ward's final points when he picked off a Benny Warner pass and raced 78 yards to paydirt.

## Robiskie Leads Team to 14-8 Win Over U-Hi Cubs

Terry Robiskie ran and passed the Second Ward Eagles to a 14-8 triumph over the University High Cubs last night for the District 6-A championship.

In the second quarter, after Federal Lumar returned a Charles Germano punt 11 yards to the Eagle 35, Second Ward went to work trying for the first score of the game. Lumar went for 5 and Pierre for 3 before Robiskie, on a quarterback sneak, ripped off 21 yards and a first at the Cub 31 yard line. Pierre got 4 but the Eagles were penalized 5 yards for delay of game. William Lumar lost one on a reverse on a good defensive play by Chuck Abraham. On the next play, Robiskie's pass was intercepted by Gary Walker at the 15 yard line and returned 16 yards to the Cub 11.

Over it, but William Luther came out of nowhere to break it up and the score at the half was 0-0.

The Cubs took the second half kickoff and appeared again to be marching for the initial score of the night. On the first play after the kickoff, Mike Morris rambled for 43 big yards to the Eagle 25 yard line where Wilbert Milton halted the big back from going all the way. After a gain of 4 yards on three tries, Ferguson rifled a pass to split end Wylie Barrow who appeared to have caught the ball in bounds at the Eagle 11 yard line. carries and scabbard Grant Pierre ran for 39 yards on 6 carries. Mike Morris led the Cubs with 71 yards on 12 carries.

Robiskie scored for Second Ward on a 7 yard smash late in the fourth quarter for the first score of the game, and followed it a few minutes later with a 4 yard pass to Tyrone Lumar. The ball was battered in the air by Ashley Moore of the Cubs and fell into the hands of the waiting Lumar. The Cubs' only score of the night came in the fourth quarter when Second Ward also its season record to 9-0 and a 26 straight win streak over the past two years, while the Cubs' season record fell to 7-1.

The first of the ballgame was a hard fought defensive struggle for both clubs. Leather was popping all over the field and the defensive stars on both sides were numerous. Each team had an opportunity to score in the first half but a fumble by Lumar at the two yard line of the Cubs nullified the only threat that the Second Ward was able to mount. A fourth down pass from John Ferguson to Mike Morris,

said the wrong thing to the officials, the red flag was dropped, and the Cubs were penalized 15 yards for unsportsmanlike conduct. Robiskie carried for 7, 5, and 11 yards before Lumar gained 5. Robiskie then carried for 3 and 13 yards and a first at the Cub 19. Lumar carried for 5, 8, and then for 2 yards at the Cub 2 yard line and Wylie Barrow came up with the ball for the Cubs.

After the Eagles held the Cubs the Second Warders were on the march again. However, a Robiskie third down pass to Pierre went through the receiver's hands at the 10 yard line and the Cubs had stopped them once more.

After the dropped pass, Ashley Moore called for a fair catch of a Lumar punt at the Cub 31. On second down Ferguson was hit while attempting to pass, and Robin Edward recovered for the Eagles on the Cub 24 yard line.

To start the fourth quarter, Second Ward was ahead 7-0.

The next time the Eagles regained possession of the pigskin, Robiskie put on a one man show carrying for 4, 7, and 4 yards before Lumar got 7 and a first at the Cub 45. Lumar again got the call and gained a tough 3. Robiskie rifled a pass to Grant Pierre out in the flat and the back hauled it in for 45 yards, but the referee signaled that he had stepped out of bounds at the 17. Robiskie ran for 3, 6, 3, and 1 before he passed 4 yards to Tyrone Lumar in the end zone for the second Eagle touchdown of

the night. Hillaire's kick split the uprights and it was Second Ward 14-0.

On the ensuing kickoff, freshman Gigger Glanelloni caught the ball at the 15 yard-line and, aided by some good blocks by his mates, ran the ball back for 35 yards and the Cub touchdown of the night. Ferguson passed to Wylie Barrow for the two point conversion and the score was Second Ward 14-University High 8. The Cubs tried an onside kick but it was unsuccessful and Second Ward, with Robiskie carrying the ball almost every play, ran out the clock.

Coach Hillary Bossier of the Second Warders said that the game was "a hard game, a tough game between two very fine football teams." Coach Clarence Millet, also of Second Ward said "The game was tough for both teams and there's a good possibility that these two teams might meet again for the State Championship." Head Coach of the University High head coach, also said that "this was a fine game between two very good football teams."

For the Eagles, Robin Edward was a standout on defense along with William Lumar and Ervin Boudoin. For the Cubs the defensive standouts were many: Chuck Abraham, Gigger Glanelloni, Mason Holden, Donnie Melton, and Noler Pourciau. Second Ward meets Edgard next week at home in Edgard for the city championship of Edgard. The Cubs finished their season and wait for the Class A State Playoff which will begin in two weeks.

# Second Ward, Edgard Play Friday For Championship of West Bank

Second Ward Eagles will entertain their up the road parish rival Edgard Tigers this Friday night.

The intra-parish clash will highlight the Eagles homecoming. The kick-off will be at 7:30 p. m. on Second Ward's field.

Still looking for their first win of the season, Edgard would like the Eagles to be their first victim. Edgard is winless in district play with a 0-5 record and 0-8 for the season. Second Ward, on the other hand, has posted a winning slate.

The Eagles were in contention for the championship of the 5-A until their loss to Central Catholic of Morgan City two weeks ago. Second Ward has suffered two defeats so far this year.

One loss for Second Ward came at the hands of Southern High of Baton Rouge, 8-18.

The other loss was to Central Catholic of Morgan City 6-20. Second Ward's district slate stands at 3-1. The Eagles are 4-2 for the season.

The Eagles have won most of their games with high scores. They downed the Chaneyville Dragons 21-12. Their wins over district teams have been their best. They soared past Holy Savior of Lockport 26-0 and they breezed past St. Joseph of Chauvin 35-0. The Eagles also snared a 24-22 win over E. D. White of Thibodaux, last year's state champions in single A competition.

A powerhouse ground game which features several hard hitting back is the mainstay of the Eagles' attack.

Quarterback Terry Rybiskie, a big 6'2", 185 pound soph signal caller, makes the offense go and Craig Savole, a 172 senior fullback, is the workhorse. They team with Robert Lumar (157), senior, at tailback and soph flanker

Robert Kensey (160) to complete the backfield.

Tackle Arthur Johnson (225) is a four-year man who tops just slightly his opposite side of the line counterpart, Ricky Grant (215), a junior with two years of experience.

Gerald Turner (150), senior, is at split end, and soph Ray Edwards (190) is at the other. Antoine Edward (190), junior, and Kevin Savole (162), soph, are the guards. Henry Borne (170), Sr., is the center.

If the starting lineup isn't imposing enough, the Second Warders have lots more personnel, 44 in all, suited out. Many of the Eagles are veterans of Second Ward's battles in the LIALO, when they were perennial district contenders.

The Eagles are quite capable of throwing the football but use their passing only to keep the defense honest.

Fullback Craig Savole has rushed 91 times for 424 yards, an average of 4.6 yards per carry with five touchdowns.

Robert Lumar, tailback, is next with 71 tries for 243 yards and a 3.4 average per carry. Terry Rybiskie, the big quarterback, has gained 284 yards for a 6.4 average. He also has five touchdowns.

Rybiskie has completed 32 of 63 passes for 548 yards. The leading pass receivers for the Eagles are tight end Ray Edwards with 12 catches for 214 yards and four TDs and Robert Kensey with nine grabs for 278 yards and one TD.

Leading the defense for the Second Warders have been tackle Arthur Johnson, linebacker Kevin Savole and guard Antoine Edward.

A win over Edgard will assure the Eagles a berth in the play-offs. After Edgard, the Eagles travel to Donaldsonville to meet Ascension Catholic next Friday to end their regular season play.

The Second Ward Eagles are coached by Rudolph G. Dinant, head coach, and Clarence D. Millet and Hillary Bossier, assistants.

## Schoolboy's No. 1 Draft Choice

You take the ferry at Reserve, cross the Mississippi, dock at Edgard, drive to Second Ward High School, and there on a football field hacked out of acres of sugar cane, you come across Terry Robiskie, quarterback and honor student.

Terry Robiskie just turned 18. He is 6-3, 205 pounds and can run 40 yards in 4.6.

If you were rating the high school draft, Terry Robiskie would be a first round choice, maybe even the first player selected out of Louisiana.

How good is he?

"He doesn't know how good he is," says a drooling Charley McClendon who had Terry as a guest for the Ole Miss game and who saw to it he had lunch at the governor's mansion. "He does most anything he wants and runs most anywhere he pleases."

Bonnie Ellender feels much the same way. Tulane, like the Tigers, is all out to land the young man who already has a brother and a sister at Southern University at Baton Rouge.

"He's one of the finest high school athletes I've ever seen," said Billy Cannon who watched Robiskie a few weeks ago when Second Ward defeated University High in Baton Rouge, 14-0, closest scrape of 1972.

"Funny he should say that," said Rudy Divaust, coach of the Second Ward Eagles. "Terry had his worst game of the season against University High. He only gained 145 yards."

All of which is a measure of this quarterback of an all-black school which has won 27 games in a row and will shoot for No. 23 when it hosts Ridgecrest Friday night in a Class A playoff.

In 10 games this season, Robiskie has run for 1,471 yards, a 14.7 average, and 22 touchdowns. Also, he's passed for 554 yards and 11 TDs.

The 33 touchdowns figure prominently in the success of a Second Ward team which is averaging 41 points on offense, three points on defense.

Watching Robiskie yesterday on the practice field, you get the idea of what Second Ward's playoff opponents are facing.

## A 97-Yard 'Sneak'

Taking the snap from center, Terry represents a co-man Wishbone. And he's made the quarterback sneak the talk of Edgard.

"Terry sneaks wherever he finds an opening," says coach Divaust. "Sometimes he'll go up the middle. When that's closed, he'll go off guard. If not there, off tackle. I just leave it to him. He always seems to find daylight."

His record indicates he could find daylight in a coal mine. So far this year he has "sneaked" for 97, 84 and 80 yards—all touchdowns.

"When they tackle Terry, it's a mistake," says assistant Clarence Miller.

Terry Robiskie is a handsome, well-chiseled athlete whose horizons seem unlimited.

Although schools like Southern Cal, Oregon, Oklahoma and Notre Dame have expressed interest, he seems bent on playing close to home where his dad, an employee at Avondale, lives.

## Eagles Defense Holds Brusly To Minus Yardage

In their finest defensive showing of the season, the Second Ward Eagles defeated Brusly, 46-0, last Friday night in a district 6-A game on the Panthers' home grounds.

Behind the outstanding play of Erwin Boudoin and Keith Alexander, the Eagles defense ripped the Panthers' offense to pieces, holding them to a mere nine yards total offense, including a minus 11 rushing.

Meanwhile, the Second Ward offense was busy picking up 312 yards total offense enroute to the Eagles' 22nd consecutive victory that included the 1971 Class A state championship.

Despite 115 yards in penalties, the Eagles managed to gain 285 yards rushing and 27 passing behind All-American candidate Terry Robiskie who scored five touchdowns on runs of 9, 16, 21, 38 and 61 yards.

In addition Robiskie, who rushed for 239 yards on 16 carries, threw a 27-yard TD pass to Tyrone Lumar.

Second Ward's other points came off the toe of Lee Hilaire

who booted four PAT conversions and Grant Pierre who scored from the nine.

The Eagles began their domination over Brusly on the first play of the game when Robiskie raced 64 yards for a TD.

By the hardest, the Panthers managed to squeeze in 10 yards on their first possession, but suffered when they had a fourth down punt blocked, giving the Eagles first and 10 on the home team's 34. Robiskie ripped off 19, then 16 for the TD.

Second Ward's defense took advantage of the gun-shy Panthers' offense by recovering a fumble before Brusly managed to get off a play following the kickoff. Pierre raced nine yards for the TD to give the Eagles an 18-0 first quarter lead.

Second Ward christened the second period by blocking another Panther punt, giving the Eagles a first on the 11. A short time later Robiskie scored from the nine.

Minutes later Brusly gave Second Ward a taste of their own medicine by blocking an Eagle punt to gain possession

of the pigskin six yards away from a score.

A penalty moved the Panthers to the three, but the Eagles defense moved them back to the 19 to bring the first half to a close.

Early in the third quarter Erwin Boudoin recovered a fumble that sent Robiskie rambling 50 yards for a score.

Boudoin got his second fumble on the following kickoff when Brusly failed to hold on to the ball at their own 24. Robiskie needed only one play to go over for a TD and a 40-0 lead.

Following a bad Brusly punt, Robiskie hit Lumar for a 26-yard TD aerial.

A 25-yard Brusly drive ended on the Eagles 39 when Wayne Milton intercepted a pass and returned it to the Panthers 42. Despite having 22 and 50 yards runs by Robiskie called back, the Eagles managed to move to the 14 but lost the ball when Robiskie tossed his only interception as the game ended.

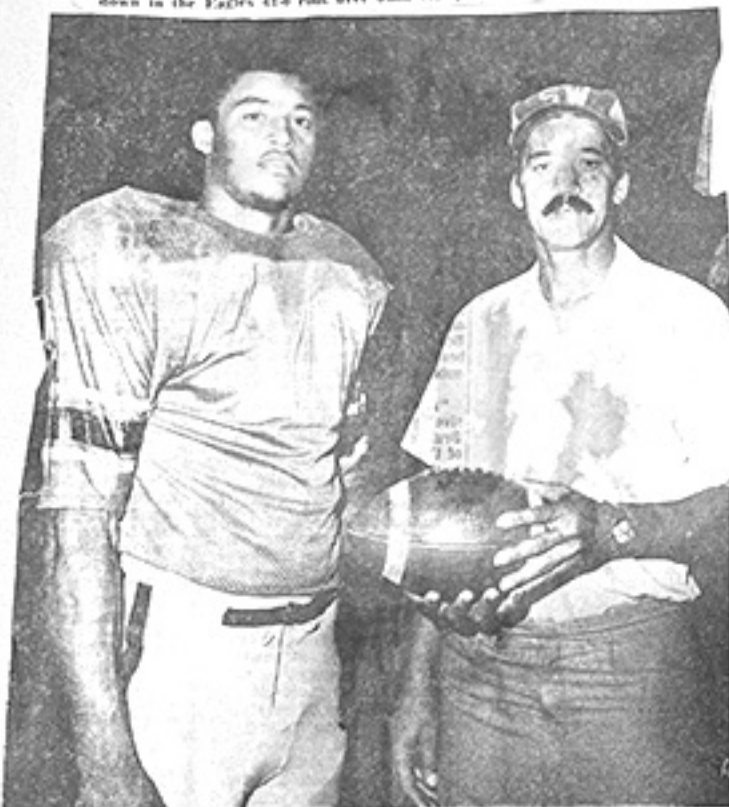
